As I've said before, I've never been through the Open & Affirming Process, and I'm enjoying learning about it and brainstorming ways to make this journey together. Fortunately, I'm in a pastors' group with five other pastors whose churches have all gone through this endeavor. I've been asking them regularly for their best ideas and what worked and what didn't.

I'd like to share with you a key concept within the Open & Affirming process. It's called, "graceful engagement." Think of it as "grace-filled conversations," where the concept and reality of grace is present in all our interactions. It means we accept one another even when we disagree, even when we may not be able to understand each other at all. We

communicate with one another gracefully – full of grace. We truly extend grace to each other as we talk about this subject. We seek to be "open & affirming" with each other as children of God. In other words, "open & affirming" begins with us.

With this thought in mind, we want to give folks an opportunity to ask questions in a comfortable way. Our "Neighborhood Gatherings" have been very helpful and quite meaningful. We also have a plan for a question and answer session on April 8th following a congregational brunch. We've already collected some questions from the congregation. There are two Q & A boxes for you to use, one in the narthex/lobby and one in Fellowship Hall. We'll again put notecards in the bulletins on April 8th. And then following our brunch on April 8th, members of the committee will strive to answer these questions and dialogue with you on these issues. CCC's Library in Room 202

Spring! It's a great time to think about volunteering. Hearing about CCC's <u>Make a Difference Sunday</u> on April 29th had me searching the church library for books on the subject.

<u>Growing Little Helpers</u> has scripture based activities for preschoolers that lead them to help their families, church, community, and the world. This book was written for Sunday School teachers, but could be used by parents. <u>Play Lightly on the Earth</u> is filled with nature activities for children from three to nine years old, without the scriptural references.

<u>The Busy Family's Guide to Volunteering</u> has ideas and resources for parents interested in all sorts of family service. <u>The Complete Idiot's Guide to Volunteering for Teens</u> has similar advice in it, but is written specifically for teens.

Finally, the library contains two books that are written with more of an eye to why and how to raise caring, serving young people than the more "hands on" books previously described. These are <u>Parenting for Peace</u> and <u>Justice and Growing Compassionate Kids</u>.

Nine teens and seven adults shared lunch, conversation, joys, concerns, and worship with the Common Cathedral community. Hannaford's graciously donated paper goods, chips, and juice for this event.

On <u>Saturday, April 7</u>, The God Squad will be bringing donations to Catie's Closet and touring their facility. We will be meeting at CCC at 10 a.m. and returning at 11:45 a.m. Catie's Closet converts an unused room within schools into a permanent resource where students in need can "shop" for free clothing and/or toiletries. Catie's Closet provides clothing in a discreet manner to students from Kindergarten thru Grade 12 in schools throughout Eastern Massachusetts and Southern New Hampshire.

As part of CCC's "Make A Difference Day," the God Squad will be working on a service project for the Lowell Humane Society and touring the facility on <u>Sunday, April 29th</u>. We will be meeting at 9 Worthen Street after coffee hour and returning at 2:45 p.m. Prior to driving to the Lowell Humane Society at 951 Broadway Street, Lowell, the group will have pizza in 9 Worthen Street. Founded in 1873 with the mission of preventing cruelty, the Lowell Humane Society works tirelessly to prevent cruelty, provide care for homeless and distressed animals and educate the public about responsible pet ownership with the goal of improving the quality of life for both animals and people.

"Hate Has No Home Here" Signs

On <u>Sunday, April 8th</u>, the Social Action and Missions Committee (SAM) will present to the congregation the "Hate Has No Home Here" signs from the Great Lowell Interfaith Leadership Alliance (GLILA). We will have a table in Fellowship Hall to view them and take one home. A quote from GLILA:



"The Greater Lowell area is home to people of all ages, races, and religions. We speak different languages, have all kinds of families and identities, share varied interests, and abilities. What we have in common is that we find home here, where all are welcome. GLILA celebrates the diversity and seeks to deepen understanding and respect. To demonstrate our continued commitment to a community where all feel safe, GLILA is participating in the "Hate Has No Home Here" campaign. Signs can be display on your front lawn or window reaffirming that "Hate Has No Home Here"; we have adapted those signs to reflect the languages most representative of greater Lowell: English, Khmer, Arabic, Hebrew, Spanish, and Portuguese."

The Open Pantry

Becky Wisniewski mentioned that Open Pantry of Lowell needs to replace their freezer. They are looking at a larger capacity one in order to offer patrons a higher tier of food vs. traditional canned/boxed food. Geoff Bryant, Executive Director of Open Pantry, was called during our meeting to clarify. Approximate cost will be \$5100. A grant has already been submitted to the Boston Food Bank for \$2500. Providing higher quality food such as produce and meats increase the tier status of Open Pantry. Higher " tier status" means a better chance of grants approved by Boston Food Bank. SAM has offered \$1500.00 from the Jean Neal Special Account.

Books and Beanies is a free service provided to the families of the children at Hasbro Children's Hospital in Providence, RI. We create a personalized superhero book and superhero hat for children, ages 4-7, undergoing various cancer treatments at Hasbro Children's Hospital.

The idea all started when a close friend of mine told me her son, a 15-month old, had a cancerous tumor, and was going to need chemotherapy and radiation. I was in absolute disbelief that someone so small would have to go through such an enormous ordeal. Over the last few months, not only did his strength keep my friend going, but we have all been amazed at his strength to keep himself going as a happy 15-month old. In all of our eyes, especially my friend's, her son really is a superhero. I came up with a concept to work on a personalized superhero book for him. I have been working on books for close friends and family members over the last two years that are personalized for their little ones. When talking with a close friend about the book I was working on for my friend's son, she thought it would be a great idea to REALLY make them into a superhero and offer a superhero beanie hat to go with their personalized book. From then on, **Books and Beanies** was an idea that is now becoming a reality.

We have been discussing the idea with the Child Life Services at Hasbro Children's Hospital. They will be offering our services to the parents, and in turn the parents would reach out to us at our email address, <u>booksandbeanies2018@gmail.com</u>. We would then complete the project and ship the package out.

I am in the process of creating a Facebook page in order to solicit funds on a project-to-project basis. There is no cost to create each book, but there is a cost associated with printing the book, as well as the cost of the yarn to make the beanie hat.

We are looking for talented knitters to work on these crocheted beanie hats on a volunteer basis. The turnaround time we would be looking for is anywhere from 2-3 weeks. We would provide the pattern that each of the beanie hats would be based on, and we would provide the cost for the yarn needed if necessary.
