### The ONA Process at CCC

The ONA Task Force and the congregation have been learning and growing together as we undertake the Open and Affirming process at CCC. On September 16, more than 40 people gathered in Fellowship Hall to share a potluck lunch and to hear the personal stories and experiences shared by members and friends of our church family. The room was filled with love and pain and hope and honesty. We were enlightened and inspired. And many asked, "What do we do next?"

On <u>Sunday, October 14</u>, the ONA Task Force will hold another gathering event after the worship service. This will be a coffee and discussion time to talk about what becoming ONA at CCC will mean – how will we put words into practice? The focus of our conversation will be the proposed CCC Welcoming Statement. Here is the draft version:

### **Draft of CCC Welcoming Statement**

We are Central Congregational Church of Chelmsford, United Church of Christ, and you are welcome here.

Through God's grace, this congregation is committed to being a loving and welcoming community of faith.

We recognize, celebrate, and give thanks for the many diverse gifts of God among us. We affirm that all people are created in the image of God and as beloved children of God, all are worthy of God's love and grace.

We declare ourselves to be an Open and Affirming congregation, welcoming into the full life and ministry of the church persons of every race, culture, age, gender identity and gender expression, sexual orientation, physical or mental ability, marital status, education, and economic status. We especially and intentionally welcome all who have known the pain of exclusion or discrimination in the church and society.

We invite all people to join us as Christ's disciples in our faith journey toward openness and understanding, justice, healing, mutual respect, and wholeness of life for all.

This proposed statement, created by CCC task force members specifically for our church, would become our declaration and promise, both to ourselves and to the public upon an affirmative vote by the church members. This vote is a few steps later in the ONA process: now is the time to talk about these words, and to do the work of educating ourselves. We do not just flip a switch and turn into an ONA church. We **become** an ONA church, together, step by step.

We invite you to talk to members of the ONA task force and Pastor Rich. We will be available each Sunday at coffee hour (look for our ONA table) and you may contact us directly.

# Music in Our Church

### BENEFIT CONCERT BY DUO OF HOPE

Duo of Hope, a world-class, cello and piano ensemble, will perform a benefit concert at Central Congregational Church on **Sunday, October 28**<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 p.m. Admission is free, but there will be a free will offering, which will help support and will partially sponsor the Christmas concert on December 9<sup>th</sup>.

You will enjoy an evening of music of the highest caliber with works by Bach, Beethoven, Elgar, and more, while supporting and making possible that more high quality music takes place in our community in the near future.

Duo of Hope was formed in 2011, when Peruvian cellist Taide Prieto and Mexican pianist Francisco Fernandez where graduate students at The Boston Conservatory. The duo has since then established itself as an important chamber music ensemble in the classical music world across the USA and Latin America.

Duo of Hope's recent and ongoing performances include The Boston Conservatory and Steinert Hall in Boston MA, Celebrity Theater in Phoenix AZ, Hope Channel in Washington DC, Loma Linda University in CA; University of Science and Arts of Chiapas, Cervantino International Festival, Paax-Fest International Music Festival and Universidad Veracruzana in Mexico; National Conservatory of Music, International Biannual Cellofest, and Peruvian Union University in Peru; as well as performances in Lisbon, Portugal and upcoming performances in London, England.

Additionally, Taide and Francisco keep a busy schedule as solo performers and music educators in the Boston area. Taide is a co-founder/co-director of Boston String Academy, a leading non-profit organization inspired by El Sistema – a very successful music education philosophy that utilizes music as a vehicle for social change. Francisco is the Music Director at Central Congregational Church in Chelmsford.

### SAM's FOCUS FOR OCTOBER - LOWELL TRANSITIONAL LIVING CENTER



The Social Action and Mission (SAM) Committee's October mission is to support the Lowell Transitional Living Center (LTLC). The LTLC provides the most vulnerable adults in the Greater Lowell area with food, shelter, stability and dignity. LTLC goes above and beyond to bring clients into the shelter from the streets for housing and community supports. The LTLC staff target those living on the streets to provide lifesaving services to address serious medical, mental health and/or substance abuse problems. LTLC outreach helps to ease the transition and remains a stabilizing force for a population in crisis.

It is a myth that homeless people are lazy and don't want to work. Joe is a client as well as a volunteer at LTLC. Joe graduated from high school and then went on to own a landscaping business. He owned this business for 20 years. He was badly hurt in a car accident and had to stay in the hospital for several weeks. His injuries lead him to develop an addiction to pain medications. When the pain pills ran out, he started drinking . . . Joe has been sober since he moved to LTLC six months ago. He worked his whole life and his goals are to stay sober, get back to work, own his own place and get back to a normal life. Joe is not used to receiving help so he has been helping out at LTLC as much as he can. He has gained experience working in the kitchen which will help him get a job.
