Warrant for a Special Meeting Sunday, December 9, 2018 of Central Congregational Church in Chelmsford, UCC

To the Members and Friends of Central Congregational Church in Chelmsford:

A special meeting of the Central Congregational Church in Chelmsford, United Church of Christ will be held on Sunday, December 9, 2018 immediately following worship to act upon the following article:

Article 1 To seek to be recognized and certified by the United Church of Christ as an Open and Affirming (ONA) congregation, and to affirm this covenant by adopting the following Welcoming Statement:

We are Central Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, and you are welcome here.

Through God's grace, this congregation is committed to being a loving and welcoming community of faith.

We recognize, celebrate, and give thanks for the many diverse gifts of God among us. We affirm that all people are created in the image of God and as beloved children of God, all are worthy of God's love and grace.

We declare ourselves to be an Open and Affirming congregation, welcoming into the full life and ministry of the church persons of every race, culture, age, gender identity and gender expression, sexual orientation, physical or mental ability, marital status, education, and economic status. We especially and intentionally welcome all who have known the pain of exclusion or discrimination in the church and society.

We invite all people to join us as Christ's disciples in our faith journey toward openness and understanding, justice, healing, mutual respect, and wholeness of life for all.

The garden was put to bed for the winter on November 4th as part of the "Make a Difference Sunday" project. We had a good crew who made light work of it. Thank you to all who participated, especially our teenagers Andrea Loew, Maddie Morin, Quintin Stuart, Nicholas Bottomley, Sam Hargett, and Jeremy Hargett. The final tally for the season was 585.75 pounds of produce, which equaled a donation of \$2,966.38 to The Open Pantry. Our big crops were tomatoes, lettuce, and swiss chard. The weeding and watering crew was great, coming out on hot, sticky, humid days to make sure the plants were adequately water and the weeds were kept to a manageable state. The winner of our weeding contest this year was Dick Herget. It may be winter now, but in a few short months we'll be starting seeds again.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE NEWS: Pastor/Parish Relations Committee Transitions

In the alphabet soup of CCC abbreviations, do you know "OPM" and "PPRC"? The OPM is our "Organizational Practices Manual." This is the reference document for how we organize, equip, and run our various church committees. If you are ever wishing you had guidelines for a church committee, read the OPM! You can find it in the church office and Linn Flint will send you the specific section you need by e-mail.

The PPRC is the "Pastor/Parish Relations Committee." This committee consists of one pastor and three members of the congregation. Qualifications for PPRC membership include Christian Character, Maturity and Trustworthiness, Patience and Flexibility, Vital Interest in the life of the church, Ability to maintain confidentiality, Ability to appreciate different points of view, Ability to negotiate and reconcile differences, and Availability for listening to church members. Did you know that you have this committee to turn to if needed?

There are guidelines in the OPM that delineate the PPRC Committee's Purpose and Limitations, as well as their Duties and Responsibilities. The PPRC purpose is to guide relations between the Pastor and the Parish (individuals, church staff, committees), serving as an advocate for both, and working to maintain a climate in which the spiritual life and mission of the Church are strengthened. The PPRC Committee in not responsible for mediating other Church concerns, such as between Church Committees or between another staff member and the congregation.

It is appropriate to have members of the Pastoral Search Committee fill the three positions on the PPRC when a new Pastor is called to CCC. The members of Pastor Rich's first PPRC, Sue Mirisola, Molly Duggan, and Peter White, have completed their service. They have done a wonderful job, and it has been a long commitment, if you include their years on the Pastoral Search Committee. My gratitude to each of them is surely echoed by the congregation, and certainly by Pastor Rich, to whom their counsel and service on the PPRC have been a blessing.

At the November 14, 2018 meeting of the Church Council, the Nominating Committee put forward candidates for the three PPRC positions: Dory Toppan, Curt Bates, and Bill Clarke.
