Farewell to Francisco and Taide

Dear Church Family,

It is with sadness that I announce that next fall my wife and I will be moving to Ann Arbor, Michigan. Therefore, this will be my last summer at Central Congregational Church.

Many of you are aware that both my wife Taide and I have the desire of continuing our musical training and education. For this reason, a year ago we decided to audition to doctoral programs. Our wish was to stay in the

area, so we both applied to schools in Boston and a few cities in Connecticut. But since this a very competitive degree, we also applied to schools in other parts of the country to open up more possibilities.

We prayed asking God for guidance and prepared the best we could. University of Michigan, one of the top schools for music in the country, offered Taide the only spot they opened for their doctoral program in cello performance this year. Not only that, they gave her a full scholarship and a very generous stipend that will cover housing, food, and family health insurance. After much prayer, it became clear to us that God was showing us a new path for our future.

While I am extremely thankful to God for this wonderful opportunity, saying good-bye will not be easy. Serving as Director of Music at CCC has been an extraordinary experience and I will miss the many friends I have made here – so many things to cherish and remember. The love, trust and support from everyone, even when some of you were not in love or agreed with some of my crazy ideas (at first) is something that will stay with me forever. This is the best job I have ever had!

Prior to being the music director at CCC, my orchestral conducting experience was very limited. The opportunities I had to grow as a conductor here have made me consider becoming a professional orchestral conductor. This is something I love

immensely and that I discovered thanks to CCC! As the beginning of this new journey in my professional career, this summer I will be attending a prestigious international festival for orchestral conductors in Maine.

The exact date of our move to Michigan is not decided yet. It will probably be sometime by the end of August or beginning of September. Before leaving, we would like to present a farewell concert, so stay tuned about this information. I will share the details about it as soon as we know it.

Thank you so much again for your love, friendship and support. Taide and I will always keep you in our hearts!


LOWELL SPINNERS GAME

What is a Meals Ministry?

Through a team of wonderful volunteers, we provide meals to church members in times of need.

How Does It Work?

When we are made aware of a need, either through a direct request for help, or through referral by someone within the church, volunteers are then contacted and asked to provide a meal (home cooked or purchased) and deliver it to the recipient's home.

How Can I Help?

The Meals Ministry is an excellent way to meet other people from church and make a difference in someone's life, with a minimal time commitment. Meals do not have to be homemade. In situations such as these, it is definitely "the thought that counts." The purpose is to help someone in need by providing a helping hand in meal preparation. FROM THE TRUSTEES: RISK MANAGEMENT TRAINING INFORMATION

If after reviewing the information below and you are interested in learning more about Risk Management training, including enrolling in the program, please contact Alan Wisniewski at alan.wisniewski@comcast.net. You may also leave a message at 978-459-9430.

The Trustees met with our insurance representative, Craig Wert, from Emery & Webb Insurance in January to review our church insurance policy coverage. As it turned out, an adjustment (increase) in the blanket coverage was made from \$4.25 million to \$4.50 million, the cost of which will be about \$500 a year. At that time, Craig told us that, if we undertook Risk Management Training, a 5% adjustment would be applied to our premium once a certain number of modules were completed. This would offset the premium increase.

The insurance representative and Trustees strongly recommend that all church leaders and volunteers take specific targeted training in Risk Management. We also strongly recommend that any church member who wants to complete certain modules do so.

The following is a list of main topics (with many subtopics) available through an on-line course:

Starting a Safety Ministry
Emergency Preparedness
Facility Safety
Financial Safeguards
Employee and Volunteer Safety
Children & Youth Safety
Transportation Safeguards

At some point, our church may wish to start a **Safety Ministry** (first topic in the above list) in conjunction with our Safe Church Advocate. Focusing on three basic concepts can help us start an effective Safety Ministry at the church:

- 1. **Value** Recognize the value of the people and facilities under your care, and embrace their safety and security as a key value in our church;
- 2. **Team** Assemble a team of people dedicated to safety and security; and
- 3. Work Set the team to work, assisted by the safety resources available online

Clearly the pantry is important to so many and serves as a safety net.

The Open Pantry is a blessing for its clients but it plays an important part in the lives of the volunteers. Some volunteers have been coming back week after week for over 19 years. Here is what some volunteers have said:

- "I look forward to coming and to being with my friends. It gets me out of the house and I feel as if I am giving back."
- "After a truck accident, my life changed. I am in pain and at the VA hospital often. I can't work but watching people's eyes light up when I give them food helps me. They need this place to get by and so do I."
- "Coming here and interacting with people feels great. This is the one place that gets me out of bed and helps me forget about my COPD and depression."



Emily Yurkus is graduating from Innovation Academy Charter School in Tyngsboro. In the fall, Emily will be going to Suffolk University majoring in History.


Our College Graduates
