Pastoral Care



Understanding "White Privilege"

There's been a lot of talk recently about White Privilege. It's a very misunderstood concept and much-maligned by those who don't understand it. The concept of White Privilege is not suggesting that those of us with white skin had it easy or that everything was handed to us. It doesn't mean that we never had to struggle and work hard for success. The concept has almost nothing to do with OUR personal stories. It has to do with the hurdles that people of color, especially African Americans, have to deal with simply because of the color of their skin. They have hurdles that Whites do not. We have some advantages that we're not even aware of most days. Below is a summary of a helpful article on the subject. You can find the entire article online, "10 Examples That Prove White Privilege Exists in Every Aspect Imaginable."

- 1. I have the privilege of having a positive relationship with the police, generally.
- 2. I have the privilege of being favored by school authorities. Kids of color get harsher discipline, and are more likely to be suspended for things white kids usually don't.
- 3. On average I attend better schools, whether public & private.
- 4. I learn about my race much more thoroughly in school.
- 5. Children's books overwhelmingly represent my race.
- 6. The media favors me. Ex. We humanize white school shooters (his horrible childhood & mental illness led him to do it) and we demonize black violence.
- 7. I don't have to worry about and overcome violent stereotypes about my race.
- 8. I can ask that we all be "colorblind" because my race is favored in society.
- 9. I don't have to deal with the daily toll of being discriminated against.
 - a. Black kids receive less pain meds for the same injuries than whites.
 - b. Addiction among whites is a "health problem." For blacks it's considered a "crime problem."
 - c. Job applications black sounding names get 50% fewer call-backs for interviews.
- 10. Most days I don't have to think about the issue of racism, discrimination and racial injustice.

SOCIAL ACTION AND MISSIONS WORK!

First we would like to thank Kelsey Hartigan for her term on SAM and wish her well as she begins college. It was a pleasure to have her knowledgeable voice on our committee. SAM is also excited to report that St. Paul's Kitchen is back and running and that SAM intends to go ahead with our regularly scheduled meal for the 5th Monday in August, with help from the God Squad.

We been able to meet over Zoom during the past few months. We have distributed money that CCC and members have entrusted to us. Two charities that we feel have responded to area needs during the pandemic are the Open Pantry of Greater Lowell and the Lowell Community Health Center. Open Pantry has been able to stay open for all but one day. They have changed their routines for distribution to increase safety for all. We want to thank for their courage and commitment. Many of their volunteers are over 60.

Rebecca Wisniewski received a call from Clare Gunther of the Lowell Community Health Center thanking us for CCC's donation. You may remember her from her visit to our church last year. She said that given all that is going on in the world it was uplifting for them to receive our check. We caught up on what that they have been doing during the Pandemic.

The Lowell CHC doesn't have beds so they were not caring for patients. However, they worked to field questions about Covid-19, direct people dealing with the illness and to get information out in multiple languages. Like many places they have had to furlough many on their staff but have been able to keep all their doctors. A bright spot is that starting in mid-March insurance companies began to allow doctors to charge for telemedicine. This is wonderful because so many of their clients have no transportation other than mass transit.

Lowell CHC has also made incredible strides with their call center. They have new technology that has reduced wait times and abandoned calls. They were also able to integrate this with translation services.

The LCHC is doing its part with COVID-19 Testing and Contact Tracing. COVID-19 walk-up, drive-by testing site is up, running, and making an impact. Testing is by appointment only. Contact Tracing at Lowell CHC is part of a state-funded effort led by the global nonprofit Partners in Health to stop the spread of COVID-19 by identifying and reaching out to those who have been exposed. Please tell everyone you know to answer the call when it comes from the MA Covid Team or with the exchanges 833 or 857.

It was wonderful to talk with Clare Gunther and to know that we were able to help fund the work that they are continuing to do.
