Dear Friends,

I pray your Christmas week was filled with many blessings! One of my treasured blessings was spending Christmas Eve with many of you who joined us for worship either in person or virtually. Our children (big kids too!) wiggled and squiggled and "shook, rattled, and banged" their instruments as they heard the Christmas Story!

During the 7:00 service, I was stunned by the beauty of so many candle lights held high in the air as we sang Silent Night, a sight that took my breath away! The peaceful serenity of the 10:00 service sent me home feeling joyful, content, and settled, looking forward to a quiet day of Christmas reflection.

As we stand at the threshold of a new year, our hearts and minds are filled with anticipation and hope for what lies ahead. It is a time not only for setting New Year's resolutions but also a sacred period in our liturgical calendar as we prepare to celebrate Epiphany. A CELEBRATION OF STAR WORDS Sunday, January 5, 2025

During worship on Sunday, we each received a star with a word on it. This is a fairly new Epiphany practice in churches around the world. We know that the Magi followed a star, which ultimately led them to Jesus. Therefore, we, too, use all the resources we have available to us—including creative prayer practices and intention words for the new year— so we too move closer to Jesus.

Star words offer a tool to actively seek and reflect on God's presence among us, both in the moment and in hindsight. Having an intention word to consider allows us to see God in ways we may not have seen God before.

We believe that star words invite a new prayer rhythm of reflection and review that can be a powerful new way to connect with God.

We practice the spiritual task of receiving by allowing the star word to choose us, not us choose a word we like. It is not we who are in control in this moment. Instead, we trust that God is present, and we let go of our desire to cultivate or control.

The Offering

"Intentional Interim Ministry: A time and process led by a specially trained Interim Pastor who utilizes specially developed materials and procedures to best prepare for the next installed ministry."

One of the more challenging aspects of the interim time is when the pastor makes changes to things "We've done this way forever!" Why do we have to change what's been working fine?

Recently, Coach Becky and Pastor Lee moved the time of the offering during worship from early in the service to nearer the end of worship. While we do understand appreciation for tradition, and that tradition can be deeply important, especially when it comes to worship, everything we do should be not only informed by years of practice but by solid liturgical guidelines.

Having heard the word of God proclaimed in reading, song, and sermon, we are invited to respond in faith and action – by giving of ourselves, our time, our talent, and our treasure. We offer our gifts to God in public worship and pray God's blessing on us, the work we do, and those who receive from us.

From an ecumenical and historical perspective, the offering is a response of gratitude to the Word proclaimed, and part of our preparation of Christ's table. Therefore, it naturally follows the sermon, affirmation of faith, and prayers of the church.

Friends,

I trust that your Christmas and New Year celebrations brought you closer to family, yourself, and your creator. It is such a special time but I also recognize it can be difficult, so I also lift up all of you who are relieved the holidays are over – for whatever reason.

As we begin this new year the Transition Team is working hard on initiating the Appreciative Interviews with all of you. I hope you have signed up, or soon will, to be interviewed. We will learn so much about each other and the hopes and dreams you all have for the future of your church. It is going to be amazing.

In addition to the work the Transition Team is doing, I have been working behind the scenes, assessing many areas of your congregational life including governance and communication as well as working with leadership. One of the collaborations that is important to your interim success is that between me and Pastor Lee.

As I continue to work with her, I have been encouraging her to more fully embrace her role as your pastor, providing the kind of leadership you might expect from your next settled pastor. One of the primary roles of the pastor is to order worship. This is the thing for which we are specially trained. While each pastor will perform this role differently based on their own spiritual charism and theology, the goal is always to create a worship experience that benefits the entire worship community. This was Pastor Lee's goal when she made the decision – with my support and within her responsibility – to move where in worship the offering is taken.

Change is always difficult. The longer a tradition has been in place, the harder it is to adjust. But this is the work of the interim time. The questions that this kind of change asks the congregation to wrestle with are challenging. Questions like, "How do I respond when something changes? Can I live into the discomfort to see if I can discover how this change might make sense if not be altogether better? Am I open to hearing different points of view? What is non-negotiable for me as a member of a community with so many different opinions and spiritualities? How will I respond if I cannot have everything the way I want it? Can I be comfortable with most of what I want in a faith community if I cannot have everything I want?"

I encourage patience and dialogue as we move through this interim time. There is so much to do, to learn, to discuss, and to dream. I encourage you to stay open to what the surprises the Spirit has in store for you, for us, for this congregation.

JANUARY MOVIE GROUP



Monday, 1/13 – The Barefoot Contessa" (1954) Scouting talent for an upcoming film to be shot in Italy, a trio from Hollywood - writer/director Harry Dawes (Humphrey Bogart), producer Kirk Edwards (Warren Stevens), and publicist Oscar Muldoon (Edmond O'Brien) - travel to Madrid, Spain to scope renowned local dancing sensation Maria Vargas (Ava Gardner). Immediately, they are struck by her beauty and presence. In fact, Maria has a profound effect on every man she meets...though the effect is as unique as each man she encounters. Producer Edwards sees a talent to be exploited for all it's worth and publicist Muldoon sees only huge marquees and dollar signs. But Harry Dawes, after a couple of brief but revealing conversations with

Maria, sees so much more. Expecting a naive Spanish peasant eager to grab at the brass ring, he finds instead a woman as smart as she is beautiful, whose main motivation is to enjoy the challenge and escape that a Hollywood career might offer a woman who will nevertheless always value the simpler things in life. Even with her innate beauty and uncommon savvy, to Maria's detriment she does not have eyes in the back of her head. Told in flashback, the viewer experiences her success in Hollywood and her quest to find the true love of a man, Count Vincenzo Torlato-Favrini (Rossano Brazzi), that has always eluded her. Written by Joseph L. Mankiewicz who also directed and produced the film, the character of Maria Vargas is said to be based on Rita Hayworth, who was offered the part. Hayworth was a Latina who later married a prince, Prince Aly Khan. Some elements were taken from Ava Gardner's life as well; the stormy relationship between Maria and tycoon movie producer Kirk Edwards based on Gardner's own relationship with billionaire film producer Howard Hughes.




Monday, 1/27 – "Carousel" (1956) American drama-fantasy musical film based on the 1945 Rodgers and Hammerstein stage musical of the same name, which in turn was based on Ferenc Molnár's 1909 non-musical play "Liliom." Starring Gordon MacRae as Billy Bigelow and Shirley Jones as Julie Jordan, the film was directed by Henry King, with a screenplay by Phoebe Ephron and Henry Ephron. As with the original stage production, the film contains some of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein's most famous songs and perhaps the most serious storyline of all their musicals. The plot of this story has an "Our Town" quality - Fifteen years after his death, a carousel barker is granted permission to return to Earth for one day to make amends to his widow and their daughter. Frank Sinatra was

originally cast to play Billy Bigelow and recorded the songs that he was to sing in the film. It had been reported that Sinatra withdrew from the film in objection to the requirement that each scene be filmed twice, one for regular CinemaScope and the other for CinemaScope 55, but according to Shirley Jones' 2014 autobiography, Sinatra quit because his wife Ava Gardner threatened infidelity if he failed to accompany her on her film set. Gardner was in the late stages of filming "The Barefoot Contessa."

SIX STONE JARS Upcoming Worship Series

A miscalculation has occurred. The wedding guests have drunk all the wine before the party is over. At times, life can feel like we're "running out" of so much, and scarcity is shutting down the party. We are invited to turn to the currency and economy of Jesus. In his economy, the true measure of abundance is fullness for the whole community, not just for some.



Beginning January 19, and for 5 weeks following, we will be exploring some of Jesus' calls to justice.

[Below is a note from the creator of this series, Marcia McFee, PhD]

Friends, we live in a time of anxiety... especially about our wellbeing and sustenance. The rhetoric of late has highlighted that fear reigns, and many are living in an attitude of "taking care of our own." But time and time again, we are reminded that in the Kin-dom of God, those whom we should consider "our own" cross many perceived boundaries. We are called by Jesus to take care of all in need, especially those most vulnerable. The Lectionary Gospel readings point to the topsyturvy way that Jesus was proclaiming an "economy" in which wealth is redistributed for the good of all.

As with all prophetic leaders, some were unhappy about Jesus' message. *We* might not even be happy about revisiting what Jesus says is the right thing to do when it comes to caring deeply for one another. But his plan was clear from the beginning—an anointing to bring good news to the poor. And as his followers, it is important for us to proclaim this and act on it here and now—for such a time as this. Who will protect the vulnerable? Church, this has been our mission since "day one." If we are looking for a way to be "relevant" in our age, this is it.

I pray that this series will ground us in the teachings of Jesus and offer us a clear vision of how we are called to be the church in this moment. May your stone jars be plenty full of "good stuff" and may we all share extravagantly the resources we have been given with those who need it most.




SUPER SATURDAY

Focus on Housing Insecurity

In January, SAM turns its attention to the ever growing problem of homelessness and housing insecurity that is now becoming a nationwide crisis. The weather right now is cold and bleak – just this morning it was only 10 degrees outside – and it is hard to imagine that anyone can survive outdoors in these conditions. But no matter the time of year, housing insecurity is a terrifying prospect for those who live in constant fear of not being able to make their rent due to a sudden unexpected expense or rent increase, or even to find a livable, affordable apartment at all.

The housing crisis has been well-documented this past year, with numerous news reports about shelters and homeless people in cities across the country. There are a number of reasons contributing to the crisis, from high housing costs that force middle-income people to remain in rental housing, pushing low-income people out of the rental market, to inflationary cost-of-living expenses, to mental health and addiction problems, to conversion of rental units to short-term rentals, and more. But the bottom line is that there are simply not enough housing units available, and this has a ripple down effect on the most vulnerable people in our society.

With your help, SAM supports several agencies in the Lowell Area that work to provide emergency shelter, short term affordable apartments, counseling and legal support, and free household goods to help people with transitioning into long-term housing. These include:

- Community Teamwork, Inc.
- Lowell Transitional Living Center
- House of Hope
- Project Kompass
- The Wish Project
- Habitat for Humanity

While shelters do not solve the housing shortage, they can help to provide "a room at the Inn" and at least temporary respite for those in need.

CHURCH FIRE SAFETY

In September, the church held a fire drill during the Sunday service. In accordance with our Safe Church Policy, everyone needs to know how to react if there ever is a fire during the time the church is in use. Everyone needs to know what to do in order to efficiently get the building evacuated and accounted for during such an emergency.

- 1. All of the Sunday School teachers have been trained how and where to get the children to safety as quickly as possible. The children will be led out of the church to an assembly spot in the parking lot near the dentists building next door.
- 2. Volunteers have been assigned to help with the nursery evacuation.
- 3. Members of the congregation should exit the church through the front doors and proceed around to the parking lot assembly area. Here you can meet your children and report if anyone is missing.
- 4. Members of the congregation **SHOULD NOT** attempt to go to the classrooms for their children. This will only add to the confusion of getting everyone safely out of the building.
- 5. A member of the church has been assigned to check the entire building to make sure everyone has been evacuated before exiting himself.
- 6. Assuming time allows, the minister will remind the congregation from the pulpit to leave by the front doors and not go to the classrooms.

There will be another unannounced fire drill in the spring to fulfill the requirement of our Safe Church Policy to have two fire drills annually.

COUNCIL CORNER

A Monthly Update on the Activity of the CCC Council

News from the December 11, 2024, meeting:

- Treasurer Dick Papenfuss reported that we are 42% of the way through Fiscal Year 2024-2025. Pledged income is under budget at 38% Year-To-Date, and total income YTD is 37%. Total Expenses are at 40% YTD. Income from the Holiday Fair and Christmas Tree and Wreath Sales fundraisers, and end-of-year pledge fulfillment, will bring an increase to the church funds as 2024 comes to a close.
- The Transition Team is working with Coach Becky David to train and prepare for the Appreciative Interview Process. Their plan is to begin holding one-on-one interviews with members of the congregation in January to gather input that will help the Team to create the Church Profile that will be used to seek our next Settled Pastor at Central Congregational Church.

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- The Nominating Committee proposed Gwen Bottomley for the position of Safe Church Advocate. Gwen brings experience from her many years of leadership in Scouting and oversight of similar BSA safety protocols. Gwen has also served as CCC liaison to the scout troops and as a CCC Deacon. Council unanimously approved the appointment.
- Pastor Lee has prioritized seeking Safe Church resources and training sessions for CCC's staff and volunteers. Samantha Shields, CE chair, reported that she has been looking into training modules that could be used for Sunday School teachers and other church groups regarding issues like abuse and neglect reporting and social media protocol. Dick plans to follow-up in February with the Chelmsford Police CRASE program discussed last year. (CRASE Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events. *"The Chelmsford Police Department offers CRASE classes to businesses and places of worship within our town year-round. As part of our commitment to fostering a secure and well-prepared community, we are extending an invitation to any businesses or places of worship that might be interested in learning more about workplace safety, and responses to attack events.")*
- John Carson, Chair of the Board of Trustees, presented some additional changes to Policy 13 "Use of Church Facilities." Previous amendments to the policy had been approved in October; the additional edits were proposed based on the realization that a blanket damage deposit of \$300 was excessive for low rent/low damage probability usage for example, use of a classroom as compared to use of Fellowship Hall and the Kitchen. Council unanimously approved the Trustees' recommended changes.
- Christine Williams of the Capital Campaign Building Committee reported that we are still waiting on the new drapes for the stage and chair surround in Fellowship Hall. She emphasized that it is important for people to receive training on the various new kitchen appliances. Christine also noted that the new LED light for the church sign at the back entrance to parking lot does not appear to be sufficient. An additional light may need to be purchased and installed.
- Samantha and Patrick Shields are working on setting up a Google Drive digital document repository for important church records, such as the Organizational Practices Manual (OPM), Personnel Manual, Committee Lists, etc. Samantha asks committees to think about any important committee documents to be included.
- Christmas Concert recap 205 performers and audience members attended the December 8 concert, and \$1250 was collected in the freewill offering.

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Excerpts from the CCC Constitution – Article VII - Council

The Council shall be the executive body of this church. It shall be composed of the Ordained Minister(s), two members of the Board of Trustees elected by that Board, Clerk, Moderator, two Deacons elected by the Diaconate, Treasurer, three Members-at-Large, and one member from each of the following committees, elected by that committee: Christian Education, Communications, Finance, House, John R. Carson Memorial Park, Music, Nominating, Pastor/Parish Relations, Sanctuary, Social Action and Missions, Stewardship, and Technology. The Council shall be the policy-making body and shall be responsible for directing and coordinating all affairs, activities, responsibilities, and interests of the Church.
