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FROM THE PASTOR'S OFFICE

FROM DUSK TO DAWN: WALKING THE LENTEN ROAD TOGETHER

I don't know about you, but it still feels like Easter is rushing toward us at full speed. Maybe it's the early signs of spring—the warmer air, the longer days, the crocuses pushing up through the soil. Or maybe it's just that life keeps moving full speed ahead.

And yet... Lent calls us to slow down. To remember. To make space in the whirlwind of daily life for a sacred story that still has the power to reshape our hearts. Lent isn't a sprint to resurrection. It's a journey to a deeper relationship with God, the Holy Spirit, and our life-saving Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

From the dust of Ash Wednesday to the dawn of Easter morning, Lent invites us to take stock and to turn inward—not in isolation, but in honesty. It asks us to seek God in prayer, not just recited words, but real conversation with God in all the small daily choices that shape who we are becoming.

The ancient words of Ash Wednesday, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," remind us that life is fragile and holy all at once. They remind us that we are human, and that we are God's beloved. Lent invites us into that sacred tension: the brokenness of the world and the beauty of God's grace, held side by side.

Some of us give something up for Lent—sweets, social media, distractions—hoping to clear space. Others take something on—daily prayer, journaling, acts of kindness—as a way of drawing closer. Whatever form your Lenten practice takes, the invitation is the same: **Make room for God.**

A couple of weekends ago, eight women joined me for a Lenten Retreat. We carved out space in our busy lives to reflect, pray, rest, and listen. We gathered around Scripture, around the table, and around one another. We laughed. We were honest. We opened ourselves to what God might be doing—not just out there in the world, but right here, in us. We reflected on Lent's journey and preparation for the joyous day of the Resurrection Celebration.

One group of retreat participants came up with a skit that still has me smiling. With humor and creativity, they offered a glimpse into what it means to journey through Lent and celebrate Christ's resurrection, not just on a holiday but in our everyday lives. With an abundance of laughter and truth, they pointed us toward the deeper meaning of Lent and Easter.

The Lenten road doesn't promise answers. But it does promise presence—God's presence with us in the questions, the quiet, the aching, the longing. And as we draw near to Holy Week, we remember that Jesus didn't skip over the hard parts of the journey. He walked straight through them. He wept. He prayed. He stayed.

That's our invitation, too.

So as Easter approaches, I encourage you to linger in the in-between. Dance and wave palms on Palm Sunday. Join the disciples at the table of Christ on Maundy Thursday. Enter the depths of pain and sacrifice on Good Friday. Sit in the silence of Holy Saturday. Don't be afraid of the "inbetween" - it's where so much of the transformation happens.

And then, when the dawn breaks, let the joy of resurrection rise up in you—not as something distant or abstract, but as something deeply personal and profoundly real.



Monday, 4/14 - "Amadeus" (1984)

An American period biographical drama film directed by Miloš Forman, starring F. Murray Abraham and Tom Hulce. Peter Shaffer adapted it from his 1979 stage play "Amadeus", originally inspired by Alexander Pushkin's 1830 play "Mozart and Salieri." Shaffer described it as a "fantasia on [a real-life] theme", as it imagines a rivalry between two 18th century Vienna composers, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (Hulce) and Antonio Salieri (Abraham). Salieri struggles to reconcile his professional admiration and jealous hatred for Mozart and resolves to ruin Mozart's career as his vengeance against God.



Monday, 4/28 - "Michael" (1996)

An American fantasy comedy film directed by Nora Ephron. The film stars John Travolta as the Archangel Michael, who is sent to Earth to do various tasks, including mending some wounded hearts. The story follows jaded journalists Frank and Huey, along with "angel expert" Dorothy, who travel to a small town in Iowa to investigate a story, where they find Michael, a disheveled man claiming to be an angel. Michael is portrayed as an unorthodox Archangel enjoying his last mission to Earth. The cast includes Jean Stapleton, Andie MacDowell, William Hurt, Bob Hoskins, Joey Lauren Adams, and Robert Pastorelli as people who cross Michael's path.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

April is for Stewardship Pledges!

Stewardship is what we do to manage something that has been placed under our responsibility. Stewardship includes wise management of our treasure, time, and talents so that we can use these things in service of the Lord for the benefit of others.



The theme for this year's Stewardship Campaign is "Dreaming God's Dream." On March 9, Cynthia Dorman presented the Stewardship Campaign for this year to the congregation. We asked the congregation how they dream that CCC uses its facilities and people for its ministry and mission to spread God's love. On March 16, Steve Hartigan presented the results of our "dream" cards and on March 23 presented the top five reasons to pledge. Our annual Stewardship

Campaign commitments (i.e. pledges) help fund not only the ongoing church operations and missions but also what we can dream as a congregation for the coming year.

Our dream is to fully fund both the Music and Christian Educations committees in the coming year. The bottom line is that we are still BEHIND where we should be (and need to be) to cover the annual budget for the church, let alone imagine our future. Inflation, along with fewer new pledges and the loss of long-time pledges continues to exert even more pressure on attempting to keep our budget balanced. Therefore, we have challenged everyone who is able to increase your pledge by \$5 per week - the cost of a large tea or coffee. Can we count on you to increase your pledge this year and help us "Dream God's Dream"?

CCC has many beautiful spaces today - a new gleaming kitchen and refreshed Fellowship Hall for example. We can dream of other ways to use these spaces for the community and for CCC - such as a spaghetti supper or pancake breakfast fundraiser for Scouts...the possibilities are endless. In order to maintain and make continued use of these spaces, we need your support and dreams about what these spaces can become!

In mid-March letters and pledge cards were mailed. If you did not receive a letter please reach out to the office. Please bring your pledge card to Stewardship Sunday on April 6. We ask you to please give prayerful consideration to increasing your pledge.

GIFT CARD MINISTRY



Some of my favorite discussions with Pastor Rich during my first few months of working with him were about the church's grocery store gift card ministry. As various folks would come to the church to pick up a Market Basket gift card, he would talk with them, giving them his full attention, making sure they felt seen and heard. His kindness and compassion made such an impression on me.

When discussing how to know whether a person was truly in need of groceries or if they would use the card for other purposes, Pastor Rich said, "I like to err on the side of compassion." Those

nine words have been engraved on my heart ever since. He told me this was an important ministry to him, as evidenced by his funeral wishes for memorial donations made to Central Congregational Church to be used for the church's grocery store gift card ministry.

How appropriate for this ministry to be named in honor of Pastor Rich as it serves to address food insecurity within the community, demonstrating Christian charity, and providing tangible support for folks in need. Handing out the gift cards and talking with the recipients is one of my favorite things about my job.

Each month, CCC provides Market Basket gift cards to several folks within and around Chelmsford and Lowell. Recipients receive an envelope that includes a \$50 gift card, food resource listings, information about local services, and various writings created by Pastor Rich, such as 'How to Reconnect with God,' and 'Scripture Readings for Comfort,' among others. I also like to include a small Bible verse card that I created for my home church's care card ministry.

The Rev. Dr. Richard B. Knight Gift Card Ministry exists because of your kindness and generosity. Donations can be made by cash or check payable to CCC with 'Gift Card Ministry' on the memo line.

In upcoming Beacon newsletters, I hope to share with you about the folks (concealing their identity for privacy) who are being helped by this ministry.

I've been a member of the Prayer Ministry for several years. It means a great deal to me to set aside time to talk with God as I pray for people in our church community, in the larger community, as well as offering my personal prayers. However, there's a small, nagging part of me that always wonders....am I doing this right? Do all those other people do a better job...a more faith-filled job...of talking with God?

I read an international daily devotional, The Upper Room, which is translated into 33 languages. Each day has a Bible quote and a short message by someone in one of the countries. One day I read a piece by a woman who said she would sometimes get overwhelmed by all the things she wanted to pray for, and couldn't decide what to do...pray for everyone by name each day? For each situation? This woman turned to God in prayer, to ask how she should pray. In time, God's answer came to her...."First, pour out in prayer what is most on your heart." Now this thought helps me open my conversation with God.

SOCIAL ACTION AND MISSIONS COMMITTEE (SAM)

At this time of year when we are considering our pledges to the church, SAM wants to remind people of the impact we can have on neighbors in our local community. In February, we received a thank you letter from the executive director of House of Hope in Lowell, which stated that CCC is one of their major donors. SAM's mission funds are primarily used to provide consistent donations of \$500 each to ten different non-profit organizations in Lowell that serve people who are food and/or housing insecure. Consistent donations are very helpful for non-profits to budget and provide consistent services to their clients each year.

In March, SAM member Julie Carney attended a conference entitled "Building Partnerships to Address Food Insecurity" that was organized by the Chelmsford non-profit, Table of Plenty. This was a three-hour event that involved a keynote speaker from the Greater Lowell Health Alliance about food insecurity trends and data; a speed networking session that had participants meeting each other for short introductions and discussions, and a panel discussion with speakers from Table of Plenty, The Chelmsford Community Exchange Food Pantry, and a social worker from Chelmsford High School. Julie was representing Central Congregational Church's SAM Ministry and the Open Pantry. During the speed networking event she met two people from the Chelmsford Housing Authority, who were thrilled to meet someone from CCC, as we are the major participant of the Secret Santa Program! CCC provided presents for 28 out of the 50 children that the Housing Authority collected for in 2024

And of course, the Open Pantry is extremely grateful for the generosity of CCC in providing donations of both money and food items, as well as the use of our facility for the recent and very successful dinner and dance fundraiser.

These are tangible examples of CCC carrying out God's word: "If you spend yourselves in behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday." Isaiah 58:10.

If you have concerns about being recognized during the livestreaming, you should not volunteer to be the liturgist, make an announcement, or sing in the choir. All of these activities will definitely make you visible during the broadcast. Also, sitting in certain areas of the pews could also expose you to being seen. If you do not wish to be seen, you should sit in the balcony, which is behind the cameras used during the service.

Also, if you do not wish your children to be identified, they should sit in the balcony with you and not participate in the children's message before leaving for Sunday school. They should leave for Sunday school by going from the balcony through Fellowship Hall to the education wing.

I want to share with the Congregation that, while we won't be holding Make a Difference Week this summer, we are actively working to lay the groundwork for future summer activities. COUNCIL CORNER

A Monthly Update on the Activity of the CCC Council

News from the March 12, 2025, meeting:

- Treasurer Dick Papenfuss reported that as of February 28 we are 67% of the way through Fiscal Year 2024-2025. Pledged income continues to run a bit behind budget, currently at 64% Year-To-Date, and total income YTD is on target at 67%. Total Expenses are at 66% YTD. Some line items such as copier expenses for color copying are significantly over budget and we will have to make some modifications in our usage of color ink in some of our materials. The heavy snow layer on the roofs resulted in reduced generation of solar energy from our panels in February and a correspondingly high electric bill. We have recently changed our electrical provider to East Coast Renewable Energy, and we will now be using all solar-generated electricity going forward with an expected savings compared to National Grid pricing.
- Further discussion was held on how to respond to a visit from the Immigration and Customs Enforcement Agency (ICE) if it should occur at our church. Council President Dick Papenfuss has spoken with the Co-Op Nursery School's Director and their information aligns with the CCC's guidance from the Southern New England Conference of the United Church of Christ (SNEUCC). The church is locked during the day, and the Office Administrator must call the Chair of Trustees or Council President before letting anyone from ICE to enter. If you have concerns about this issue, please speak to Pastor Lee.
- Worshipper Privacy The viewable areas of our sanctuary (that are seen on livestreamed services) were reviewed. Anyone who desires to eliminate the risk of being seen on any of our online media should understand that the only area that is not visible to online viewers is the balcony. Parents who do not want their children to be seen on the internet need to refrain from sending the children to the front of the church and any other live performances involving the children. This information has also been communicated in CCC announcements.
- Annual Meeting Warrant The proposed warrant was reviewed by Council members and approved. The date of the Annual Meeting will be Sunday May 18, 2025, immediately following the worship service. Article 3 on the warrant involves updating our CCC Constitution by replacing the title of "Massachusetts Conference" with "Southern New England Conference of the UCC." This correction would be inserted in all relevant areas of our church Constitution.
- The due date for Annual Reports of committees and other CCC annual reports to be uploaded to Google document folder is April 11, 2025.

- All Committees should submit final copies of their <u>approved</u> meeting minutes to Church Office Administrator Peggy Kelly for our church records. Chairs of committees should submit minutes dating from May 2023 to present. Private material should be redacted. Peggy has set up Google Drive folders for these reports, contact her for the link.
- The CCC Open and Affirming (ONA) committee has been reactivated following Coach Becky's recommendation, as we are soon to undergo a Pastoral Search. (Note CCC voted to be Open and Affirming in December 2018). The renewed committee has the following members: Deb Lyons, Alisa Knight, Jody Cross-Hansen, Margie Dissinger, Cindy Bruetsch, Emmett Lyons, Madison Lauricella, and Mary Horne. The committee's goals include bringing educational projects and initiatives re: gender issues. There will be a celebratory anniversary event with additional information, and plans for community events.
- Any individual or group that has an announcement or activity to share during a Sunday worship service is asked to make an appropriate request to Pastor Lee regarding the scope and length of the announcement. The Pastor needs this information at least 2 weeks before your proposed announcement. Having this information in advance allows for optimal planning of elements of the worship service to allow for continuity and flow.
- CE Chair Sam Shields discussed Safe Church Training and Mandatory Child Abuse Reporting Training. This is required by conference guidelines and Massachusetts Law. The individuals or groups that should receive this yearly training are Deacons, Sunday School teachers and Youth Group Leaders, Mission trip chaperones and volunteers over the age of 18, Music Committee (to supervise Junior choir rehearsals), and Christ Care Leaders.

Excerpts from the CCC Constitution – Article VII - Council

The Council shall be the executive body of this church. It shall be composed of the Ordained Minister(s), two members of the Board of Trustees elected by that Board, Clerk, Moderator, two Deacons elected by the Diaconate, Treasurer, three Members-at-Large, and one member from each of the following committees, elected by that committee: Christian Education, Communications, Finance, House, John R. Carson Memorial Park, Music, Nominating, Pastor/Parish Relations, Sanctuary, Social Action and Missions, Stewardship, and Technology. The Council shall be the policy-making body and shall be responsible for directing and coordinating all affairs, activities, responsibilities, and interests of the Church.
