September 24 will be the first meeting of the new year with the traditional pot luck.


Donations to the Open Pantry of Greater Lowell will resume in September, but you are always welcome to donate directly to the Open Pantry during the summer.

Monday, May 12 – "Conclave" (2024) Following a pope's death or resignation, the College of Cardinals meets to select the new pope. The event is called the "conclave," which in Latin translates to "with key." The conclave has remained virtually unchanged for the last 800 years. In the film, Cardinal Lawrence (Ralph Fiennes) is tasked with running this covert process after the unexpected death of the beloved Pope. Once the Catholic Church's most powerful leaders have gathered from around the world and are together locked in the Vatican halls, Cardinal Lawrence uncovers a trail of deep secrets left in the dead Pope's wake—secrets which could shake the foundations of the

Church. In real life, Pope Francis, born Jorge Mario Bergoglio on December 17, 1936, in Buenos Aires, Argentina, was the 266th leader of the Catholic Church and the first pope from Latin America. Pope Francis passed away on April 21, 2025. Movie trivia - When Cardinal Lawrence looks in the deceased Pope's bedside drawer, there is a bunch of rubber bands. This is a hint that the deceased Pope portrayed in the film was Pope Francis, because it was reported that on his elevation to Pope, he called his Buenos Aires newsagent personally to let him know he wouldn't be continuing his custom of returning the rubber bands from his daily newspaper at the end of each month.



Monday, May 26 – "Hacksaw Ridge" (2016) A true story set in World War II. In the movie, Andrew Garfield stars as Desmond T. Doss, an American combat medic who, as a Seventh-day Adventist, refused to use a weapon of any kind. For his incredible bravery and regard for his fellow soldiers during the Battle of Okinawa, Doss became the first conscientious objector to be awarded the Medal of Honor. Doss saved the lives of 50–100 wounded infantrymen atop the area on Okinawa known by the U.S. Army's 96th Infantry Division as the Maeda Escarpment or Hacksaw Ridge. An interview recorded in his lifetime

with the real Desmond T. Doss in which he briefly describes his experiences during World War II is shown during the end credits of the film. Viewer warning - Rated R for intense prolonged realistically graphic sequences of war violence including grisly bloody images.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

May Means Stewardship Comes to a Close!

Stewardship is what we do to manage something that has been placed under our responsibility. Stewardship includes wise management of our treasure, time, and talents so that we can use these things in service of the Lord for the benefit of others.

The theme for this year's Stewardship Campaign was "Dreaming God's Dream." Our annual Stewardship Campaign commitments (i.e., pledges) help fund not only the ongoing church operations and missions but also what we can dream as a congregation for the coming year. Our dream is to fully fund both the Music and Christian Educations committees in the coming year. Therefore, we challenged everyone who is able to increase their pledge by \$5 or 10% per week. Pledges were collected on Stewardship Sunday, April 6 and blessed by Pastor Lee. Additional pledge cards were available in the pews or by pledging online at www.cccchelmsford.org/stewardship.

Did we succeed in "Dreaming God's Dream?"

As of Easter Sunday, we had 86 pledges compared to 103 last year. As of this writing, there are still 18 pledges missing. The good news is that for pledges received, 39 increased and 34 stayed the same. Only 8 pledges decreased and 6 were lost. We also received 5 new pledges!

Financially, we are still short over \$25,000 compared to last year, but are hoping that the missing 18 pledges will make up the difference. If so, we should be about \$7,500 above last year's total pledged amount. This is still good news, but not enough to fully fund both Music and Christian Education committees. After the remaining pledges are counted, a complete analysis of the Stewardship campaign results will be provided in the upcoming 2025-2026 budget.

To everyone who pledged, **thank you** from the Stewardship Committee for supporting Central Congregational Church.

When she calls periodically to request a Market Basket gift card, we chat for a bit. Barb shares her health issues and concerns, financial challenges, and explains her dietary restrictions. Financial challenges were an especially big concern for a while.

Barb lives with her young adult son, who I'll call 'Tim.' Tim also has some health problems that require a specific diet. He is working and helps with their finances. Having enough food is a challenge in their home; they are both so appreciative of the assistance that CCC provides. They visit the pantry but Barb commented that they don't always find foods compatible with their dietary restrictions.

When coming to CCC to pick up a gift card, Barb walks slowly down Fletcher Street with the aid of her walker. She said that she has rides to the grocery store and medical visits covered through insurance. Barb is kind and always so very thankful for the listening ear and the assistance. She shared that a recent diagnosis is weighing heavy on her heart and appreciates being prayed for. Would you please pray for her and her son, Tim?

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

This summer the town will replace a manhole in a storm drain at the top of the parking lot and then connect and replace a pipe. Using the same contractor, CCC will replace the broken pipe near the Co-Op playground, for which we are responsible. We have gotten estimates for bringing electricity off a pole to the end of the parking lot to light our church sign at North Road and for the Christmas tree sales. The final step is to repave the church parking lot and replace the deteriorating asphalt berms with granite curbing along the Carson Park and playground sides.

Important message regarding church back door

The church back door has been found unlocked (overnight) twice in April. This recurring issue is a source of considerable concern regarding building security.

The hex key should NOT be used to keep the door unlocked since anyone can walk in if no one is at the door.

If some members of your group do not have a key fob, you should station someone at the door until your meeting begins. If someone arrives after the start of your meeting, you should arrange to have them call or text you or someone in your group so they can be let in.

If you are a committee chairperson or leader of a group meeting after hours in the building, it is YOUR responsibility to ensure that the door is locked when the last person in your group has left the building.

If you are the key holder for an outside group, your group will lose access to our building if the door is found unlocked and we determine that your group was responsible.

We invite all people to join us as Christ's disciples in our faith journey toward openness and understanding, justice, healing, mutual respect, and wholeness of life for all.

COUNCIL CORNER

A Monthly Update on the Activity of the CCC Council

News from the April 9, 2025, meeting:

- Assistant Treasurer Margie Dissinger reported that as of March 31 we are 75% of the way through Fiscal Year 2024-2025. Pledged income is still under budget at 72% Year-To-Date, and total income YTD is at 73%. Total Expenses are at 71% YTD, so we currently have a \$10,000 cushion. Some line items such as snow plowing are well over budget, but the professional building will be billed by CCC for their portion of the parking lot plowing expense. Office Supplies and Electricity expenses are being monitored. A double charge to the church for CORI checks will be refunded to the church in the form of a credit on future Safe Church CORI check billing.
- The Board of Trustees presented reports from the audits that they conducted of both the Assistant Treasurer – Income and the Assistant Treasurer – Expense. The audits of fiscal years 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 found all books and record-keeping to be in order, and the Assistant Treasurers follow all recommended procedures and practices. Recommendations were made to plan ahead for how institutional knowledge will be passed on to future church treasurers.
- The Council voted unanimously to elect Virginia Crocker Timmins to the position on the Board of Trustees that was recently vacated by a resignation.
- A request by the Naish Family to hold a bake sale during coffee hour to raise money for the Jimmy Fund was approved unanimously. The date of the bake sale will be sometime before October 2025.
- The Capital Campaign Building Committee reported that paving of the church parking lot will not be scheduled until the town has resolved some pipe issues that run below our lot. The Trustees and the House Committee are investigating the feasibility of running electricity out to the church sign on North Road for improved lighting.
- The Nominating Committee reported on their progress in finding volunteers to fill vacancies on various church committees. The completed Slate of Nominees will be presented for church vote at Annual Meeting on May 18, 2025.

Carson Memorial Park, Music, Nominating, Pastor/Parish Relations, Sanctuary, Social Action and Missions, Stewardship, and Technology. The Council shall be the policy-making body and shall be responsible for directing and coordinating all affairs, activities, responsibilities, and interests of the Church.
