# FROM THE PASTOR'S OFFICE

## Peace in the Midst of Chaos

#### Dear Friends,

It has been a beautiful day! I'm in my home office, where the wall in front of me is all windows, one of which is open. I can hear the gentle breeze blowing the fading leaves of the red maple out front, and the warm afternoon sun is shining on me and my desk. There are trees rustling in the distance, and every now and then I hear a chirping bird. Add to this peacefulness the fact that it's been a very productive day, and I have to say, September 22 goes down as an A+ kind of day! Now to get ready for fall.

One of my favorite parts of October is the crispness of the air. There's something refreshing about stepping outside and drawing in a deep breath of autumn air—cool, clear, and grounding. It's nature's time of transition with leaves changing colors, the air whispers of change. The season itself seems to invite us to pause, to breathe, to remember the goodness of God.

And yet, beyond the beauty of fall, we cannot ignore the chaos of much busier schedules at home, school, and work. Our lives may feel pretty chaotic at times, full of noise, responsibility, and worry. And the world outside of our day to day lives feels pretty chaotic these days too, with conflict and division, shootings that have come close to home, and more.

In seasons like these, it is tempting to feel overwhelmed, or even to believe that chaos will have the final word. That's why I'm so thankful for my A+ day. It reminds me that there is peace in the chaos, that Jesus tells us, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you." (John 14:27a). That peace is our deep assurance that even when the world trembles, God remains steadfast.

As people of faith, our response to the world's chaos is not despair but hope, not fear but trust, not indifference but love in action. Like the turning leaves, we can let go of what weighs us down and let God's Spirit renew us. Like the cool autumn breeze, we can breathe deeply of God's grace and share it freely with others.

This October, I invite you to create intentional moments of peace. Step outside and notice the beauty. Pick up a fallen leave and explore it's beauty. Take a breath of the fresh air and give thanks. Let God's Spirit calm your anxious heart. And when the noise of the world grows too loud, may you hear instead the still, small voice of the One who promises never to leave us nor forsake us.

In the words of the prophet Isaiah, "You will keep in perfect peace those whose minds are steadfast, because they trust in you" (Isaiah 26:3). May this be our witness as a church community—people who, even in times of chaos, reflect the peace of Christ and offer hope to the world.

Monday, 10/13 – "The Sting" (1973) Set in 1936, this American caper film involves a complicated plot by two professional grifters (Paul Newman and Robert Redford) to con a mob boss (Robert Shaw). The film was directed by George Roy Hill, who had directed Newman and Redford in "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" (1969). The screenplay, by David S. Ward, was inspired by real-life cons perpetrated by brothers Fred and Charley Gondorff and documented by David Maurer in his 1940 book "The Big Con: The Story of the Confidence Man." The film plays out in sections introduced by old-fashioned title cards, drawn by artist Jaroslav "Jerry" Gebr in a style reminiscent of the Saturday Evening

Post. It is noted for its use of ragtime music, particularly the melody "The Entertainer" by Scott Joplin, which was adapted (along with other Joplin pieces) for the film by Marvin Hamlisch, producing a Billboard-topping soundtrack and a top-10 single. The film's success created a resurgence of interest in Joplin's work. Released on Christmas Day of 1973, "The Sting" was a critical and commercial success and hugely successful at the 46th Academy Awards, where it won seven of its 10 Oscar nominations, including Best Picture, Best Director, Best Film Editing and Best Original Screenplay; Redford was also nominated for Best Actor. The film rekindled Newman's career after a series of big-screen flops. Regarded by the Writers Guild of America as having one of the best screenplays ever written, "The Sting" was selected in 2005 for preservation in the U.S. National Film Registry of the Library of Congress as being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant."



Monday, 10/27 – "The Grapes of Wrath" (1940) Directed by John Ford, this American drama was based on John Steinbeck's 1939 Pulitzer Prize-winning novel of the same name. The film tells the story of the Joads, an Oklahoma family of sharecroppers, who, after losing their farm to drought and increased mechanization during the Great Depression in the 1930s, become migrant workers, and end up in California. The motion picture details their arduous journey across the United States as they travel to California in search of work and opportunities for the family members, facing numerous obstacles along the way, including the Dust Bowl and the harsh realities of capitalism. The film's cast includes

Henry Fonda as Tom Joad and Jane Darwell as Ma Joad, the role for which she won the Academy Award for Best Supporting Actress. (John Ford won for Best Director.) "The Grapes of Wrath" is widely considered to be one of the greatest films of all time. In 1989, it was one of the first 25 films selected by the Library of Congress for preservation in the United States National Film Registry for being "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant." The novel and film explore themes of human perseverance, oppression, and the impact of capitalism on the lives of the migrant workers. The title "Grapes of Wrath" is derived from a phrase in the Battle Hymn of the Republic, symbolizing the anger and discontent of the oppressed.



## COUNCIL CORNER

## A Monthly Update on the Activity of the CCC Council

## News from the September 10, 2025 Meeting:

- Treasurer Dick Papenfuss reported that we are starting our new 2025-2026 fiscal year with strong pledging. July and August pledge income is slightly ahead of budget at 17%. (Year-to-date target is 16.67%.) Let's keep it going! Overall income is on target at 15%. YTD expenditures are also on track at 16% of budget. Some notable issues are the new electricity supplier not crediting our solar-generated electricity, and so there has been a cost for electricity usage. Dick Papenfuss is working to straighten this out with the new company. The water bill has also been exceeding budget due to a leaky faucet that has been discovered in the utility closet sink. The faucet will be repaired or replaced. The church insurance package is higher than budgeted, as insurance rates are increasing nationally. Committee expenses are minimal at this point in the year.
- The Trustees are reviewing office copier costs and seeking to identify why the expenses ran so far above budget last year. All committees and church groups that use the copier, or have Peggy make copies on their behalf, are requested to think before copying. Ask yourself, "Is a paper copy necessary? Can this document be printed in black and white? Is the setting of the copier correct for the copy job?" Each color copy costs 10x what a basic b+w copy costs. The Council approved a suggestion by the Trustees that a guideline for copier use be distributed to church committees. A special code to identify committees may also be instituted. Thank you to Trustee Virginia Crocker Timmins for taking the lead on this review. Thank you as well to Patrick Shields for his study of the copier usage statistics.
- Bonnie McGrath, Safe Church Administrator, Pastor Lee, Jennifer Delikat, Jennifer Hart, and Samantha Shields have all been involved in reviewing the CCC Safe Church Policy to be sure it is up-to-date and aligns with church insurance requirements. A task force will continue to review the policy and will bring recommended revisions to the Council at a future meeting.
- Ana Reátiga was elected to an open 2-year term on the Social Action and Missions Ministry.
- The Council approved a request by Lynn Horton to have the option for the church to host a craft fair on Saturday, December 6. Outreach by the Communications Committee will help assess if potential craft vendors would be interested in participating. This event would be in addition to our traditional Holiday Fair held on Saturday, November 22.
- The 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of Central Congregational Church in Chelmsford is upcoming in 2026! The official date of our organization is April 13, 1876. Events and celebrations will be held throughout the year. Council will create a special CCC 150 Committee; volunteers are invited to contact Lynn Horton or Val King.
- Transition Team member Glenn Dissinger reported that the CCC profile has been fully approved and is now posted on the Conference website!
- The Capital Campaign Celebration Dinner will be held in Fellowship Hall on Saturday, October 25. Volunteers are needed to help run the event; please contact Christine Williams.
- The Community Yard Sale held on August 16 in Fellowship Hall raised \$876.25 for CCC!

- Pastor Lee and Sunday School Coordinator Jennifer Hart are planning monthly fellowship events for church families and friends.

#### Excerpts from the CCC Constitution – Article VII - Council

The Council shall be the executive body of this church. It shall be composed of the Ordained Minister(s), two members of the Board of Trustees elected by that Board, Clerk, Moderator, two Deacons elected by the Diaconate, Treasurer, three Members-at-Large, and one member from each of the following committees, elected by that committee: Christian Education, Communications, Finance, House, John R. Carson Memorial Park, Music, Nominating, Pastor/Parish Relations, Sanctuary, Social Action and Missions, Stewardship, and Technology. The Council shall be the policy-making body and shall be responsible for directing and coordinating all affairs, activities, responsibilities, and interests of the Church.
