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FROM THE PASTOR'S OFFICE

Grateful Hearts and Open Hands

Dear friends,

As we move into November, our hearts turn naturally toward gratitude and preparation—toward Thanksgiving and the sacred season of Advent that follows. These weeks invite us to pause, to count our blessings, and to prepare room in our hearts for the One who comes among us as Emmanuel, "God with us." But gratitude is not always easy. Around us, many neighbors are struggling—families facing rising costs, individuals uncertain about their next meal, elders feeling the chill of loneliness, and others who wonder how to keep hope alive in a difficult season. It can be hard to rejoice when we know that not everyone shares equally in life's abundance.

And yet, this is exactly where our faith meets real life. Gratitude, at its truest, does not ignore pain—it transforms it. When we give thanks, we remember that all we have is a gift from God. And when we act out of that gratitude, we become part of God's gift to the world. Scripture reminds us that thanksgiving and generosity are deeply intertwined:

"You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity, which will produce thanksgiving to God." (2 CORINTHIANS 9:11)

As disciples of Christ, our call is not only to give thanks *for* blessings but to share them—so that others, too, may have reason to give thanks. When we offer food to the hungry, kindness to the lonely, and compassion to those who suffer, we reflect the heart of the One who came among us in humility and love.

As we prepare our homes and hearts for Thanksgiving, and as Advent approaches with its promise of hope and light, may we live with *grateful hearts and open hands*. Set an extra place at your table. Donate to the food pantry. Offer a listening ear or a prayer. Each small act of kindness becomes a candle of hope in someone's darkness.

May this season draw us deeper into the spirit of Christ—the One who came to feed the hungry, comfort the sorrowing, and remind us that love is never meant to be hoarded, but shared.

LOWELL TRANSITIONAL LIVING CENTER

SAM will be sponsoring the Lowell Transitional Living Center (LTLC) for the month of November 2025.



LTLC, located on Middlesex Street in Lowell, is an emergency shelter that provides 24-hour staff support for unaccompanied adults experiencing homelessness. In addition to emergency shelter, LTLC provides meals, showers, clothing, personal hygiene items, and case management with referrals to community-based resources including medical and behavioral health services. Case managers work with clients to develop a housing plan to identify housing opportunities, employment placement, access to benefits and crisis intervention.

The Winter Emergency Bed Program (WEBP) which operates solely on donations is an additional LTLC program that runs from November to April and provides additional capacity during the coldest months of the year with 30 cots, access to showers, laundry, and meals, as well as outreach and engagement services.

There will be a donation box in the church narthex for the month of November. Please consider donating some of these much-needed items:

- Hygiene items:
 - deodorant, razors, shaving cream, soap, toothbrushes, toothpaste, body lotion, shampoo, conditioner, feminine hygiene products, alcohol-free wipes/sanitizers, and ChapStick.
- Adult sized clothing: new socks/underwear
- New or gently used, sizes XL- XXXL clean winter clothing: gloves, mittens,
 hats, jackets, sweatshirts and sweatpants. Jackets and sweatshirts are the
 most needed items and are claimed as soon as they are donated. (Unfortunately, LTLC has very little
 storage space and they cannot accept warm weather clothing at this time.)
- Bedding and towels: new or gently used wash cloths, bath and hand towels, twin sheets and light weight blankets.

Monday, 11/10 – "Sergeant York" (1941) The film follows the true life of Alvin Callum York. Born in rural Tennessee and raised in the mountains, Alvin learned to shoot guns when he was a boy, becoming an expert with both a pistol and rifle before his teens. Influenced by his high school girlfriend (and future wife) Gracie Williams, he also became a devout born-again Christian and gave up the drinking, brawling, smoking, gambling, and bare-knuckle fighting that marked his early days. When the US declared war on Germany

in April 1917, York was drafted into the army where he sought exemption as a conscientious objector but was turned down. Inducted into the 328th Infantry Regiment on November 24, 1917, he distinguished himself in basic training until he was ordered to shoot at human forms on the target range. After days of soul-searching, York reconciled himself to military service and completed his training, and his unit sailed to France the following spring. His regiment was assigned to the Meuse-Argonne salient during the final great Allied offensive from September to the war's end on November 11, 1918. On October 8, 1918, York, then a corporal, was part of a company assigned to attack a heavily defended hill near Chatel-Chehery. Pinned down by intense machine-gun fire, York joined a squad of 17 men that attempted to outflank the German position from the rear of the hill. After capturing 20 German soldiers, the Americans were discovered by other German troops in neighboring trenches, who opened fire on them. Within minutes the squad was down to seven unwounded men, York included. The squad's officers and NCOs had all been killed or wounded, meaning that York was now in charge of the squad's survivors. With a rifle and pistol, he reached a point near the occupied German trenches that were firing on his squad and subdued them. The surviving Germans surrendered to York. He was promoted to sergeant and awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for his amazing feat. At the end of the war he returned to Tennessee, married Gracie, and settled on a farm presented to him by his home state. The modest hero turned down many offers for endorsements, claiming "this uniform ain't for sale," and used the proceeds from the book and movie of his life to establish schools for poor mountain children. Directed by Howard Hawks, the movie stars Gary Cooper as Alvin C. York, Joan Leslie as Gracie Williams, Walter Brennan as Pastor Rosier Pile, and as Rosie York, June Lockhart, who died October 23 at the age of 100.



Monday, 11/24 – "Something's Gotta Give" (2003) American romantic comedy-drama film written, produced, and directed by Nancy Meyers that explores themes of love and relationships, particularly a love triangle involving a wealthy music executive and his younger girlfriend's mother. It stars Jack Nicholson and Diane Keaton as professionals who find love for each other in later life, despite being complete opposites. Keanu Reeves and Amanda Peet costar, with Frances McDormand and Jon Favreau playing key supporting roles. The film received

positive reviews for its humor and performances; Diane Keaton was nominated for her 4th Best Actress Academy Award and won the Golden Globe award for that category. Keaton, who died October 11 at the age of

79, revealed in her 2011 memoir "Then Again" which film from her decades-long career held the top spot in her heart — "Something's Gotta Give." She admitted she initially believed the movie was destined to fail, but it ultimately became "my favorite film." She explained the reason why, citing a happy memory of shooting a love scene with Nicholson on the film and the great surprise she got when a check "with a lot of zeros arrived in the mail for my back-end percentage." She later found out that the extra money came courtesy of Nicholson, who had given her a piece of his percentage from the movie's gross. Keaton had a soft spot for the "Father of the Bride" movies as well, which were also written and directed by Nancy Meyers.

One of the ways the congregation has directly helped individuals with food insecurity is through the giving of Market Basket gift cards. Over the years, Pastor John, Pastor Rich, and now Pastor Lee, have met with people who come to our church door seeking help. When a pastor is not available, Peggy Kelly or Linn Flint have handed the gift cards to the person. In all cases, a face-to-face interaction and a warm, understanding contact is made.

The gift cards are purchased through the Diaconate Good Samaritan Fund and more recently through the Pastor Rich Gift Card Ministry, which was established to honor his wish that any memorial gifts in excess of those needed to purchase the bench in his memory be used toward providing gift cards to persons in need. **Currently, the balance in the fund is only enough to last through December.** Without your continued donations, CCC will be unable to assist others through this vital ministry.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN BUILDING COMMITTEE

We now have completed everything on the long list of Campaign building projects for inside and outside the church, as well as others necessitated by additional Board of Health requirements, unforeseen broken or rusted and leaking pipes, plus inconveniently located ledge and huge boulders.

Thanks to generous gifts from the Buchanan family and our next-door neighbor the Chelmsford Dental Associates, we were able to undertake numerous additional projects: refurbishing the pews in the sanctuary (a major one), recarpeting the parlor, new shades for the sanctuary and Fellowship Hall, new quartz countertops and stainless cabinets, and granite curbing along Carson Park and the Central Co-Op Nursery School playground.

We held an all-church dinner on October 25 to celebrate these achievements and thank all of you for helping with your time and labor, monetary contributions, patience, and support. The Capital Campaign Committee that Council appointed had an excellent combination of skills and rapport to pull off a long and complicated undertaking. PREPARING FOR THE BIRTH OF CHRIST

Introducing Our Advent/Christmas theme, "Reflecting the Sacred" by Worship Design Studio

As we look ahead to the season of Advent and the celebration of Christmas, we are invited to embark on a rich and deep journey of reflection as we join with Worship Design Studio worshippers around the world, "Reflecting the Sacred." Drawing on this new series we are encouraged to see, in unexpected places and everyday moments, the presence of God — the sacred hidden within the ordinary, the holy embedded in the mundane.

In a world that often divides life into the "sacred" and the "secular," this Advent/Christmas season invites us to blur that boundary. Worship Design Studio description puts it this way: "The Christmas season is a time when the juxtaposition of the sacred and secular feels sometimes blatantly opposed, and sometimes quite blurred. This year, you are invited to a spiritual journey of seeing ALL things pregnant with the Holy."

Our theme invites us to notice that the sacred is not only found in our worship services, but also in our kitchens, in our gatherings, in our waiting and anticipating, in our brokenness, and in our celebrations. For our congregation, this is particularly resonant: the big and small moments of our lives — the grief and hope, the service and rest, the waiting of Advent and the joy of Christmas — all hold space for God's presence.

What This Will Look Like in Our Life Together

Here's how "Reflecting the Sacred" will guide our journey this season:

- **Weekly focus**: During each week of Advent, we will explore a different way the "sacred" shows up in our lives. We'll weave scripture, reflective practices, and community conversation into our time together.
- Worship experience: Our liturgy, music, visuals (we hope!), children's message, and even our gathering spaces will invite a fresh awareness of the everyday as holy.
- **Personal reflection**: We will encourage everyone children, youth, adults to practice noticing sacredness in daily life. Perhaps it's a moment of breath, a tree in winter, a conversation with a neighbor, a memory of longing, or a flash of joy. These all become doorways to the Divine.

• **Community and individual engagement**: There are many ways we will gather as a community and ways you are invited to reflect as a family or on your own as we ponder the sacred in our lives.

See other articles in this edition of the Beacon for ways to be involved; and watch the Tuesday announcements for ongoing updates and opportunities to prepare and celebrate the Birth of Jesus.

Reach out to Pastor Lee with any questions, reflections, and thoughts you have along our journey together.

As we light the first Advent candle, may we open ourselves to the holy in the hum of life. As we sing the carols and hear the story of the Christ-child, may we remember that the sacred didn't just arrive once in history — it quietly arrives again each moment, each day, when we turn our attention and our hearts. Let us journey together this season, marked by wonder and awareness, service and stillness, expectation and encounter.

May we *reflect the sacred* in what we do, what we are, and who we become. Blessings on this Advent season of transformation and hope! With gratitude and anticipation.

ANOINTING: A SACRED BEGINNING TO ADVENT

On the **first Sunday of Advent**, we will begin our season of *Reflecting the Sacred* with a simple **ritual of anointing**. Throughout scripture, anointing with oil marks holy moments—times of healing, calling, blessing, and preparation. It is a reminder that God's presence is not distant, but close and tender; that we are set apart for love, service, and hope. As we light the first candle of Advent, this anointing will help us open our hearts to God's renewing Spirit, readying us to notice the sacred that shimmers in our ordinary lives.

If you are worshipping from home or unable to join us in person, please let us know so that we may include you in this blessing—whether with oil or lotion you have at home, a vial of oil you may pick up from the office, or a prayer shared from afar.

Let this Advent begin with the gentle touch of grace and the assurance that we all belong to the sacred story unfolding among us.



WHY THIS MATTERS NOW

In a season that often races toward consumption, perfection, and surface-hustle, "Reflecting the Sacred" offers a counter-rhythm. It invites us to **pause**, to **see**, to **be present** — to glimpse Emmanuel, "God with us," not just in the manger, but in every breath, every waiting space, every ordinary encounter.

Especially considering our community's mission — rooted in healing, hope, service — this theme aligns beautifully. We know that transformation happens when the sacred meets the everyday — when service dogs offer presence, when stories of grief become stories of resurrection, when we hold hands in brokenness and rise together in hope.


OTHER WAYS YOU CAN BRING MEANING TO THE ADVENT SEASON



COUNCIL CORNER

A Monthly Update on the Activity of the CCC Council

News from the October 8, 2025 Meeting:

- Assistant Treasurer Margie Dissinger reported that our budget year-to-date benchmark is 25%. September pledge income is close to budget at 23%. Unpledged income remains below prediction. Co-Op rent payments have resumed after their summer break and that will improve our income line. Expenditures are mostly in line with budget expectations. Payroll is on target. Boiler maintenance bills were higher than expected due to repairs and maintenance tasks. It is suggested that we increase our boiler expense line for next year. Electricity costs are 51%, which is significantly higher than projected but it may be due to some unusual accounting practices. Dick has been communicating with the new electricity company, Perch Energy. In summary, our total expenses to date are 23% (\$84,913) and our total income is 21% (\$77,808). The upcoming Holiday Fair and Christmas trees sales should help strengthen the income balance.
- Our Safe Church Policies and Procedures document has been reviewed by the Trustees. They have made some changes based on insurance company requirements. The Council voted unanimously to adopt these updates, effective immediately.
- A Safe Church Task Force has been formed to further review the Safe Church Policies and Procedures:
 Bonnie McGrath, Safe Church Advocate, Jennifer Delikat, Trustee and past Safe Church Advocate,
 Jennifer Hart, Sunday School Coordinator, and Lynn Horton, Council Chair and Deacon, with input from
 Pastor Lee Atherton and Samantha Shields, Christian Education Committee Chair.
- The Trustees and Council continue to work toward establishing cost-saving measures and practices for copier use. Please minimize use of color copying whenever possible.
- Cynthia Dorman from the Sanctuary Committee discussed the challenges with arranging greeters every
 week for church services. She asked committee representatives to speak to their respective committees
 to ask for volunteers for greeters. It would be nice to have a variety of new and long-term church
 members serve as greeters. Members of the congregation are invited to sign up to be Sunday greeters
 as well.
- Council Vice President Glenn Dissinger will follow through on a recommendation that came out of the
 meetings with Coach Becky. To enhance communication between the church committees and the
 Council, Glenn will visit one committee a month at their regularly scheduled meeting. This will include
 Trustees, Diaconate, CE, Music, SAM, and House. He will be reaching out to chairs to learn when would
 be a good time to attend each committee.
- Christine Williams reported that the RSVPs for the Capital Campaign Celebration Dinner on October 25 have been slow. She has responses from about 50 people. This event will be catered by Bianco Catering and there will be no cost to attendees.
- The 150th anniversary of the founding of Central Congregational Church in Chelmsford is upcoming in 2026! The official date of our organization is April 13, 1876. Pat Vondal, Church Historian, is working on a theatrical presentation of highlights of our church history. Volunteers are invited to join a special CCC 150 Committee: contact Lynn Horton or Val King.

- John Carson reported there was a fuel leak from the Open Pantry truck parked in our lot. It was cleaned up but the resulting soft spot in the pavement will need to be patched. Please keep an eye on the parking lot and notify the Trustees or the House Committee of any issues so they can be addressed immediately.
- A reminder to all committees to post their committee meeting dates and other activities on the church calendar, and to submit Council reports to Peggy no later than 8:00 am on the Tuesday before the Council Zoom. Thank you!

Excerpts from the CCC Constitution – Article VII - Council

The Council shall be the executive body of this church. It shall be composed of the Ordained Minister(s), two members of the Board of Trustees elected by that Board, Clerk, Moderator, two Deacons elected by the Diaconate, Treasurer, three Members-at-Large, and one member from each of the following committees, elected by that committee: Christian Education, Communications, Finance, House, John R. Carson Memorial Park, Music, Nominating, Pastor/Parish Relations, Sanctuary, Social Action and Missions, Stewardship, and Technology. The Council shall be the policy-making body and shall be responsible for directing and coordinating all affairs, activities, responsibilities, and interests of the Church.
