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FROM THE PASTOR'S OFFICE

Reflecting the Sacred: Seeing God in Every Direction

December arrives with its familiar mixture of beauty and bustle. Lights begin to glow in windows. Evergreen branches find their way onto mantels. Our calendars fill. Our hearts stretch—sometimes with joy, sometimes with longing, sometimes with both at once.

This Advent, our worship theme, **Reflecting the Sacred**, invites us to slow down and look more deeply—to remember that the Holy is not tucked away in one season or one sanctuary, but woven through every place we pause long enough to notice.

To reflect something is to catch and share its light. Advent reminds us that we are invited to do the same with God's presence. Each candle we light on the wreath—Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace—does more than brighten a room; it teaches us how to see. Hope shows us where God is at work even when the world feels dim. Love helps us recognize the sacred in each person we meet. Joy reveals the glints of grace that show up unexpectedly. And Peace draws our scattered spirits back to center.

My prayer for us this month is that we become people who reflect the Sacred wherever we go. Some of us will reflect God's love through service or generosity. Some will reflect God's peace by offering a listening ear. Some will reflect God's hope simply by getting up each morning and choosing kindness in a weary world. All of it matters.

And as we move toward Christmas—toward that astonishing moment when God chose to dwell among us in flesh and breath—we remember that the Sacred is never far away. It is in the faces of those we love, the stories we share, the burdens we carry together. It shines in the laughter of children, in quiet moments near a candle's flame, and even in the places where shadows fall. Nothing is too ordinary to be touched by grace.

May this season draw you closer to the God who reflects light and love into every corner of life—and who invites you to do the same.

SOCIAL ACTION AND MISSION (SAM)

December is a busy month for SAM:

Secret Santa is well underway at this point, with both on-line sign-ups and in-person sign-ups in Fellowship Hall. Santa's helpers have a few reminders to help us keep track of this busy event:

- ✓ Please wait until Sunday December, 7th to bring in your gifts
- ✓ Please make sure that each gift has a permanent tag with child's name and "From Santa"
- ✓ Each gift must also have the tracking tag with gift ID # and Family letter that can be easily separated from the gift without tearing the paper (no tape).
- ✓ If your gift is a gift card, please put it in a box or small bag rather than an envelope, so it does not get lost in the piles of presents that get left on the stage.
- ✓ All gifts must be received by Sunday the 14th.
- ✓ If you do not receive an email from the on-line sign-up system, your selection may not have been complete. Try again or email santa@cccchelmsford.org or speak to Cindy Bruetsch or Julie Carney.
- ✓ Note multiple items listed per gift I.D. indicate either/or selections. You should not provide everything on the line item. All children (including siblings) should be receiving three gifts.

The Christmas Fund – This is a United Church of Christ special mission drive that collects money to support both retired and active UCC ministers, church workers, and their families. For more than a century, The Christmas Fund has been a beacon of love and care – providing direct financial assistance to these essential people, who guide us in our faith journeys. In 2024, the Fund touched the lives of 766 individuals across the UCC. As the cost of living keeps rising, please keep in mind these faithful servants and ensure that they can experience the love of the church in their hour of need. Contributions can be placed in the SAM pew envelopes with The Christmas Fund written on the memo line or the envelope.

Open Pantry of Lowell - Ongoing Support - On behalf of Open Pantry, SAM extends a big thank-you to everyone who has been answering the call to bring in non-perishable food items to help support needy families in danger of losing their government food support. For newcomers who may wonder why we support Open Pantry of Lowell rather than the Chelmsford Food Pantry, it is because the Open Pantry was the first food pantry to be established in this area, almost 50 years ago, and several of the founders belonged to

Central Congregational Church! Helen Glinos was one and Jane and Alan McKersie were long-time volunteers, Geoff Bryant served as the Director for a number of years, and Becky Wisniewski is the current Board Chairperson. The Open Pantry differs from many other local pantries, in that they do not just hand out prepacked bags of food to their clients. In addition to staples like canned fruits and vegetables, pasta, tuna and peanut butter, the amount depends on the size of the family – each client receives a bag of fresh produce usually including carrots, onions, potatoes, apples, etc. Most importantly, each family gets to choose from a selection of frozen meats, chicken and fish, soups and chowders, and bags of dried fruits and nuts and other items that the pantry buys from the Boston Food Bank every week. In a very small space, volunteers are currently serving between 40 – 50 families a day, providing these nutritious supplements to their grocery budgets. SAM has voted to give the Christmas Eve collection to the Open Pantry again this year, due to the unprecedented needs for food security, as the cost of food keeps increasing, while government support programs are being cut back.

ANNUAL "WE CAN" MAKE A DIFFERENCE FOOD TREE FOR THE OPEN PANTRY



As we usher in a new season of Advent we welcome back the tradition of the Can Tree to aid in collection for the Open Pantry of Greater Lowell. As we continue this effort, the Christian Education Committee invites the congregation to help build our Can Tree by donating non-perishable food items or monetary gifts. The Can Tree will be back starting the first Sunday of Advent on November 30th during the Advent Festival and will remain out through early January 2026.

We encourage you to take this home as a reminder and contribute that item if you are able. You can also bring that ornament back to hang on the can tree as a decoration.

CCC MOVIE GROUP

Monday, 12/8 – "The Man Who Came to Dinner" (1941) Directed by William Keighley, the film is based on the 1939 play by Moss Hart and George S. Kaufman which became a Broadway hit before being adapted for the screen. The story follows Sheridan Whiteside (Monty Woolley), a famous and acerbic radio personality, who slips on ice while visiting the home of the Stanley family in Ohio. After injuring his leg, he insists on staying with them during the Christmas holidays, turning their lives upside down. Whiteside's overbearing personality leads him to meddle in the family's affairs, causing chaos and hilarity as he interacts with various characters, including his secretary Maggie Cutler (played by Bette

Davis) and other guests. The film is celebrated for its sharp wit and comedic elements, showcasing the absurdities of high society and the eccentricities of its characters. It highlights themes of self-importance and the impact of celebrity culture on ordinary lives. The performances, particularly by Woolley and Davis, received praise for their comedic timing and character depth. The cast includes wonderful actors Billie Burke, Mary Wickes, Ann Sheridan, and Jimmy Durante as Banjo, a character based on Harpo Marx. Sheridan Whiteside is based on noted theatre critic and personality Alexander Woollcott. Moss Hart and George S. Kaufman were good friends with Woollcott, a famous critic, radio personality, and lecturer at the time. Woollcott requested that they write a play FOR him, but they never came up with a plot. One day Woollcott came to visit Hart unexpectedly and turned his house upside down. Woolcott's overbearing, outrageous, and unbearable behavior included insisting that he would not go to bed unless a milkshake and chocolate cookies were prepared for him, demanding that all the heat in the house be turned off, refusing to sleep in any room other than Hart's bedroom,

accusing the servants of dishonesty, and writing in Hart's guestbook "I wish to say that on my first visit to Moss Hart's house I had one of the most unpleasant evenings I can ever recall having spent." When Hart told Kaufman of the visit, he asked, "Imagine what would have happened if he broke his leg and had to stay?" They looked at each other and knew they had a play.



Monday, 12/29 – "Guess Who's Coming to Dinner" (1967) American romantic comedy drama film starring Spencer Tracy (in his final role), Sidney Poitier, and Katharine Hepburn, and featuring Hepburn's niece Katharine Houghton. The film was one of the first of the time to depict an interracial marriage in a positive light, as interracial marriage historically had been illegal in many states of the United States. It was still illegal in 17 states until June 12, 1967, six months before the film was released, and scenes were filmed just before antimiscegenation laws were struck down by the Supreme Court in Loving v. Virginia. The film was the ninth and final on-screen pairing of Tracy and Hepburn. Tracy was very ill during

filming but insisted on continuing. Filming of his role was completed just 17 days before his death in June 1967. Hepburn never saw the completed film, saying it would be too painful for her. Guess Who's Coming to Dinner was released in December 1967, six months after Tracy's death. Be sure to watch for the bust of Spencer Tracy sculpted by Katharine Hepburn herself; it was used as a prop, on the bookshelf behind the desk where Sidney Poitier makes his phone call.

Where Faith Meets Conversation



Pull up a chair—Pub Theology is back on December 13! 🧨 🧎



What if church wasn't just something that happened in a sanctuary on Sunday morning... but also around a table, with a burger to munch, a favorite drink in hand, and a circle of people talking honestly about life and faith?

That's exactly what Pub Theology is all about.

On Saturday, December 13, we're gathering once again for an evening of good conversation, good company, and good questions. No sermons. No pop quizzes on

the Bible. Just real people wondering together about real life.

This month, as Christmas draws near and our calendars fill up, our guiding theme will be:

"Finding the Sacred in the Holiday Chaos."

We'll wrestle with questions like:

- Where do you actually feel closest to God in December?
- How do we handle grief, stress, or loneliness during "the most wonderful time of the year"?
- What might it look like to slow down and notice the holy in ordinary things—twinkling lights, shared meals, or even long checkout lines?

You don't have to have all the answers. In fact, it's better if you come with questions. Pub Theology is a judgment-free zone where:

- You can speak honestly, or simply listen.
- You can bring a friend who might never walk into a traditional church service.
- You can show up exactly as you are—doubts, curiosity, and all.

We'll meet on Saturday, December 13 at 7 p.m. at the 110 Grill in Chelmsford. Food and drinks will be available for purchase, and the conversation is on us. 😊

offer presence, when stories of grief become stories of resurrection, when we hold hands in brokenness and rise together in hope.


OTHER WAYS YOU CAN BRING MEANING TO THE ADVENT SEASON

As a companion to Reflecting the Sacred, you might choose to read one of the following books.





COUNCIL CORNER

A Monthly Update on the Activity of the CCC Council

News from the November 12, 2025, meeting:

- Treasurer Dick Papenfuss reported that as of October 31 we are 33% of the way through our fiscal year. Total pledge income year-to-date is close to budget at 32%. Unpledged income is at 26%. Our total income as of October 31 is 28%, which includes all income sources. Total expenditures are also at 28%. Expenditures for boiler maintenance and electricity have been higher than budgeted, but we expect to recoup some of the electricity costs after the new year. It is suggested that we increase our boiler expense budget line next year. The upcoming Holiday Fair and Christmas trees sales should help strengthen the income balance. All CCC special account funds are being transferred from various institutions to one consolidated location at Northern Bank and Trust. This bank offers better services and better rates for savings etc. and is already the bank where CCC holds a checking account.
- The Trustees presented a revised and updated Office Administrator Duties and Responsibilities document for Council approval. Office Administrator Peggy Kelly, Pastor Lee Atherton, and the Trustees contributed to the review and editing of the job description and the Trustees incorporated the suggested revisions. The members of Council unanimously approved the updated document.
- Office Administrator Peggy Kelly will be leaving her position on November 25th. Margie Dissinger will
 serve as Interim Office Administrator until a permanent replacement is hired after our next settled
 pastor comes and is established. It was discussed that any "church business" requiring Margie's
 attention should be addressed during her working hours and not during non-work hours or church

- events. Margie will be in the church office Monday Friday, 9:00 am to 1:00 pm, beginning December 1. Thank you for taking on this role, Margie!
- The Greater Lowell Interfaith Leaders Alliance (GLILA) is seeking a location for an event on Thurs. December 18, 2025, 6:00 -9:00 pm. They are looking for a church to host a unique one-day event that will be free and open to the public and will showcase the Mevlevi (Whirling Dervishes) Master Abdulkadir Dikici. Potential challenges could be parking availability for other church meetings/choir rehearsals held on that same date and noise interruptions. Also, the anticipated attendance is very large: up to 200 people. It was decided that these concerns are not insurmountable and that we will offer our church for this event, with a request to pay the church rental fee.
- The Council discussed the subject of seeking or accepting corporate sponsorship of our public fundraising events. There is an opportunity to partner with a local business who is interested in sponsoring the November 22 Holiday Fair. Potential sponsors would pay a fee to the church, and their name would be listed as a sponsor in print and other media. After some discussion it was decided that we could consider this as revenue source, but we need to be sure that any advertising is consistent with our church's mission to the community. Events that are more closely related to CCC (i.e. Holiday Fair and concerts) would be excluded from corporate sponsorship. (Note: the local company was offered the opportunity to sponsor the Winter Craft Fair on December 6.)
- The Safe Church Task Force is progressing well with the review and updating of our Safe Church Policies. Bonnie McGrath, Safe Church Advocate, has been leading the work on this project.
- CCC 150th Committee update Pat Vondal, CCC Historian, presented some ideas for celebration
 activities including a theatrical presentation about our church history. Valerie King is asking for
 volunteers to assist with a celebration in Spring of 2026. (Date to be determined.)
- In response to congregational requests, there have been some updates to the "Donate to CCC" button on our website. There are new options to customize your donation: Pastor Rich Gift Card Ministry and Capital Campaign; West Virginia Mission was changed to Ramps for Neighbors. Thank you, Patrick Shields, Tech Committee. Look for links to this Donate button in future Beacon (electronic) newsletters and church announcement e-mails. Note: there is a fee charged to CCC for each electronic transaction. You may wish to add a small amount to your donation to help cover the cost of this convenience. Thank you!
- Council discussed the challenges facing local food pantries currently. Some are reaching storage
 capacity, even as the need has increased. CCC will continue to collect donations for the Open Pantry in
 Lowell and encourages members to consider making cash donations as this allows the Pantry to fill
 gaps in their inventory. The Open Pantry was the first food pantry in Lowell, founded in 1981 by local
 church groups that saw a need for short-term food assistance in the community. CCC and specifically
 the late Helen Glinos were key to the establishment of the Open Pantry.

Excerpts from the CCC Constitution – Article VII - Council

The Council shall be the executive body of this church. It shall be composed of the Ordained Minister(s), two members of the Board of Trustees elected by that Board, Clerk, Moderator, two Deacons elected by the Diaconate, Treasurer, three Members-at-Large, and one member from each of the following committees,

elected by that committee: Christian Education, Communications, Finance, House, John R. Carson Memorial Park, Music, Nominating, Pastor/Parish Relations, Sanctuary, Social Action and Missions, Stewardship, and Technology. The Council shall be the policy-making body and shall be responsible for directing and coordinating all affairs, activities, responsibilities, and interests of the Church.

House Committee

The past month for the House Committee has had many plumbing problems to fix: sinks in the pre-school and janitor's closet and a first floor toilet. All the tables and chairs in Fellowship Hall should have caps on the legs now. Two parking spaces in the middle of the first row have "S's painted on them indicating the spots are for seniors or handicapped individuals; the paint is very light and will be painted more vividly in the spring. The boiler at 9 Worthen has been fixed, and the boiler in the main building had a dysfunction due to someone turning off a switch to the water reservoir. Please don't turn on or off any switches unless asked to by a member of the House Committee. Jim Clark is in the process of teaching the members of the Committee how to care for and problem solve with the boiler. We're in the process of throwing out old paint and cutting the Eagle Scout plaque down to size. The lawn mower has been repaired we think. The gas will be drained and we'll see how it goes next spring. The snowblower is fixed and serviced and is ready to go. MapCon, a computer app that keeps track of routine and seasonal activities, as well as a list of vendors, is back up and running. The wall in the north stairwell has been scraped and painted, and the metal cover for the outside windowsill will be replaced. Storm windows in the Sanctuary have been lowered, and we're in the process of figuring out who is responsible for upkeep and maintenance in the kitchen. So far no mice have visited us, but we'll keep an eye out for them.
