Epiphany Sunday: Following the Light into a New Year

On Sunday, January 4, we will gather for Epiphany Sunday, a day that invites us to reflect on how God's light continues to guide us—often in ways that are quiet, surprising, and deeply personal.

Epiphany tells the story of the Wise Ones who followed a star into the unknown, trusting a light they did not fully understand. Their journey reminds us that faith does not begin with having all the answers. It begins with paying attention—learning to notice where Christ's light is already shining in ordinary places, and allowing that light to change the direction of our lives.

During worship, we will reflect on what it means to "go home by another road," and we will take part in a meaningful Epiphany practice: receiving a guiding star word for the year ahead.

Star words are offered as a spiritual companion for the year—a single word such as *hope, courage, compassion, trust, or belonging*. These words are not predictions or expectations, but gentle invitations. They serve as reminders of how God's light may be calling us to walk, love, and live more fully in the months to come.



Everyone will receive a star word to carry with them into 2026 during worship.

If you are unable to be with us in person on January 4 but would still like to receive a star word, please reach out to the church office, and we will make sure a star word is mailed or delivered to you, so you can be part of this Epiphany practice wherever you are.

Whether you join us in the sanctuary or from afar, you are part of this journey. May the light of Christ guide your steps, open new roads before you, and lead you deeper into hope in the year ahead.

We look forward to sharing this Epiphany moment together.

THE GOSPEL ACCORDING TO PIXAR: EXPLORING FAITH THROUGH FILM

Stories have a way of reaching us where lectures sometimes can't—through imagination, emotion, and wonder. Many of us have experienced that kind of storytelling through Pixar films, which speak not only to children, but to the deep places in adults as well.

This winter, I'm exploring the possibility of forming a small discussion group around the book **The Gospel According to Pixar**, written by **Todd Brewer** and **David Zahl**. The book looks at familiar Pixar movies through a theological lens, uncovering themes of grace, loss, hope, belonging, and redemption—often in surprising and deeply meaningful ways.

This would be a **movie exploration group**, where, together, we would watch selected Pixar films (either on our own or possibly together) and gather for conversation, reflection, and connection. No theological background required—just curiosity and a willingness to reflect on how faith shows up in unexpected places.

At this point, I'm simply **gauging interest**. If enough people would like to participate, a group will form, and we'll choose a **day and time that works best for most**.

If this sounds like something you'd enjoy, please **reach out to Pastor Lee** to let me know of your interest. Your response will help determine whether—and how—this group takes shape.

Sometimes wisdom arrives wrapped in animated stories. Let's see what light we might discover together.

Focus on Housing Insecurity

SAM's January focus is on housing insecurity. On Sunday, January 11th, Kirk Fulton, Executive Director of the Chelmsford Housing Authority (CHA) will speak at our morning service about their mission to provide affordable housing for vulnerable populations in Chelmsford. Central Congregational Church has been coordinating with the CHA for many years through their Secret Santa Program. We have been told that CCC is one of the biggest supporters of the program, as we typically provide gifts for 28 children, whose wish lists are collected and provided to us by the CHA.


JOIN ME FOR LUNCH WITH LEE!

January Movie Group



Monday, 1/12 – “Sully” (2016) Also known as “Sully: Miracle on the Hudson”, “Sully” is an American biographical drama film directed by Clint Eastwood and written by Todd Komarnicki, based on the 2009 autobiography *Highest Duty* by Chesley “Sully” Sullenberger and Jeffrey Zaslow. Tom Hanks stars as Sullenberger, with Aaron Eckhart as Jeffrey Skiles, and co-stars Laura Linney, Anna Gunn, Autumn Reeser, Holt McCallany, and Jamey Sheridan. The film follows Sullenberger's January 15, 2009, emergency landing of US Airways Flight 1549 on the Hudson River, in which all 155 passengers and crew survived, and the subsequent publicity and investigation. Vince Lombardi, not the football coach but the captain of the first ferry to reach the downed plane, appears as himself. During the four days of Hudson River filming Lombardi ad-libbed his own lines. David Letterman appears via archive footage from the night he interviewed the real crew of Flight 1549 who

are digitally swapped with their film counterparts. Katie Couric also appears as herself. Movie detail: Director Clint Eastwood chose to film the escape onto the life raft without rehearsal to authentically capture the physical difficulty of the situation.

Monday, 1/26 – “His Girl Friday” (1940) A classic American screwball comedy film directed by Howard Hawks, starring Cary Grant and Rosalind Russell and featuring Ralph Bellamy and Gene Lockhart. The movie's plot centers on a newspaper editor named Walter Burns who is about to lose his ace reporter and ex-wife, Hildy Johnson, newly engaged to another man. Burns suggests they cover one more story together, getting themselves entangled in the case of murderer Earl Williams as Burns desperately tries to win back his wife. The screenplay was adapted from the 1928 play *The Front Page* by Ben Hecht and Charles MacArthur. This was the second time the play had been adapted for the screen, the first occasion being the 1931 film which kept the original title “The Front Page.” The script for “His Girl Friday” was written by Charles Lederer, with the biggest alteration to the source material being the change of Hildy Johnson's gender, an idea introduced by Hawks. Production of the film was often delayed because the frequent improvisation and numerous ensemble scenes required many retakes. Hawks encouraged his actors to be aggressive and spontaneous. “His Girl Friday” has been noted for its surprises, comedy, and rapid, overlapping dialogue. Hawks was determined to break the record for the fastest film dialogue, at the time held by “The Front Page.” He used a sound mixer on the set to increase the speed of dialogue and held a showing of the two films next to each other to prove how fast his film was.

“A THOUGHTFUL BEGINNING: TALKING ABOUT WHAT MATTERS MOST” OR “WAIT! I’M NOT READY”

Beginning on Sunday, January 11, during worship, Pastor Lee will invite us into a meaningful—and surprisingly life-affirming—season of reflection. We’ll be spending time together gently exploring themes of dying, death, and grief—not in a way that is dark or overwhelming, but in a way that is honest, compassionate, and rooted in care for one another.

While these are not topics we usually bring up over coffee (or at all!), they are deeply human ones. Thinking ahead about our wishes can be one of the greatest gifts we give—to ourselves and to the people who love us. Following worship on January 11, everyone is invited to stay for a hands-on, supportive workshop designed to help you begin—or even complete—your funeral planning. This is not about making final arrangements in a rush or facing anything alone. It’s about clarity, peace of mind, and offering a loving gift to your family: the gift of knowing what matters most to you.

We’ll also introduce the Five Wishes framework, a thoughtful and accessible way to reflect on what we want for ourselves and for those who will care for us. During this first workshop, we’ll offer a brief overview of all five wishes and then take time to explore Wish #1 together. The remaining four wishes will be explored after worship on Sundays the 18th, 25th, February 8th, & 15th. This allows us to take this journey at a gentle, manageable pace.

You don’t have to attend every Sunday. And if you prefer to talk with Pastor Lee privately, that is also an option.

If you’re thinking, *“This sounds important... but also like a lot,”* you’re not alone. That’s why we’re doing this together, with reassurance, curiosity, and even a bit of lightness. There’s no pressure to have all the answers. Just come as you are.

You may leave with paperwork started, questions answered, or simply a sense of relief that you’ve taken a first step. And you might be surprised to find that talking about these things doesn’t diminish life—it can deepen our gratitude for it.

Join us on January 11, and in the weeks that follow, as we make space for conversations that truly matter—held with care, hope, and compassion.

LECTIO DIVINA: QUIET SCRIPTURE, DEEP PEACE

Before worship each Sunday, join us for a gentle time of prayerful Bible reading. In this simple practice, we read a short passage several times, listen for how God is speaking, and—only if you wish—share a few words with the group. Come as you are, come when you can. HOLY CANS, BATMAN!

You may have noticed something a little unexpected around church lately—**Pastor Lee collecting bottles and cans**. Yes, it's true! A secret superhero side hustle (though the title does raise questions). It *is*, however, a simple, joyful way to do some good. Those empty soda bottles, water bottles, and cans you might normally toss into the recycling bin are being gathered with purpose and hope.

Each returnable helps **reduce our carbon footprint**, keeps materials out of landfills, and supports a greener, more sustainable way of caring for God's creation. Being faithful stewards sometimes looks like big gestures—and sometimes it looks like rinsing a soda can.

Even better, the funds raised will go directly toward **training a life-saving service dog**—a companion who will offer stability, safety, and hope to someone living with PTSD or mental health challenges. It's a powerful reminder that small actions, when gathered together, can change lives.

So, save your redeemable bottles and cans, bring them to church, and know that your “empties” are doing double duty—**caring for the earth and helping save a life**. No cape required.

PUB THEOLOGY


Big Questions, Good Company – at a Pub to Boot!

What do you do with the big questions, the ones that don't have quick answers?

Questions about meaning.

Pub Theology is a space for exactly those kinds of conversations. It's not a class, and it's not a debate. It's an open, welcoming gathering for thoughtful conversation in good company, over food and drink, in a relaxed pub setting.

This gathering is for anyone—people of all faith traditions, people who are spiritual-but-not-religious, people who are skeptical, curious, questioning, or simply interested in good conversation. You don't need to agree with anyone else. You don't need to believe anything in particular. You just need a willingness to listen, reflect, and share if you feel comfortable.

We'll explore big questions like:

- What helps us make meaning in our lives?
- What do we trust when things feel uncertain?
- What experiences have shaped the way we see the world?

There are no right answers. No pressure to speak. You can jump into the conversation or just listen in. Come as you are, bring your curiosity, and enjoy thoughtful dialogue in a space where questions are welcomed.

- **Sunday, January 25** – The Confirmands will visit **Christ Jubilee International Church**, experiencing worship in a different cultural and theological context.

These visits are not about comparison or judgment, but about curiosity—learning to listen, to ask thoughtful questions, and to notice where the sacred shows up in many forms.

Please keep our Confirmands and their mentors in your prayers as they continue this meaningful journey. And if you see them in the hallways or at coffee hour, feel free to offer a word of encouragement—you never know how much a simple “I’m glad you’re here” can mean.

We are grateful for these young people and the energy, insight, and hope they bring to our community.

COUNCIL CORNER

A Monthly Update on the Activity of the CCC Council

News from the December 10, 2025, meeting:

- Treasurer Dick Papenfuss reported that as of November 30 we are 41% of the way through our fiscal year. Total pledge income year-to-date is right on target at 41%. Unpledged income is at 36%. Our total income as of November 30 is close to the expected figure at 39%. Total expenditures are at 37%, so we are in a good financial position. The Holiday Fair met the budgeted goal of raising \$6500, and the new Winter Craft Fair and Festival will bring in additional funds. The Christmas trees and wreaths are selling well. Additional fundraisers may be planned for 2026. Committee expenses and Office expenses are in control and under budget – thank you to everyone for using the copier responsibly. End of year donations should be made by December 31.
- On behalf of the Christian Education Committee, Chair Samantha Shield proposed increasing the scheduled hours of the Sunday School Coordinator position from 10 hours per week to 13 hours per week. Funding for this year will come partially from the CE account and partially from church funds, as approved by the Treasurer and the Trustees. The entire salary will be included in the 2026-2027 budget. The motion to accept the increase was approved unanimously.
- Bonnie McGrath, Safe Church Coordinator, presented the completed work of the Safe Church Task Force. The Safe Church Policy document for CCC has been completely revised and updated by the Task Force (Bonnie McGrath, Jennifer Delikat – Trustee and former Safe Church Advocate, Jennifer Hart – Sunday School Coordinator, and Lynn Horton – Council Chair) with input from the Trustees, the Christian Education Committee, and Pastor Lee Atherton. Bonnie highlighted the areas where the document has been made clearer and where the guidelines include vulnerable adults. Forms included in the document have been updated as well. The motion to accept the revised Safe Church Policy was passed unanimously. Bonnie emphasized that this document will be reviewed at least once a year to maintain its accuracy.
- The Greater Lowell Interfaith Leaders Alliance (GLILA) Whirling Dervish event on Friday, December 19, 2025, 6:00-9:00 pm will be held at CCC. GLIA will pay an agreed upon reduced rental fee for the use of Fellowship Hall. The event is free and open to the public.

Excerpts from the CCC Constitution – Article VII - Council

The Council shall be the executive body of this church. It shall be composed of the Ordained Minister(s), two members of the Board of Trustees elected by that Board, Clerk, Moderator, two Deacons elected by the Diaconate, Treasurer, three Members-at-Large, and one member from each of the following committees, elected by that committee: Christian Education, Communications, Finance, House, John R. Carson Memorial Park, Music, Nominating, Pastor/Parish Relations, Sanctuary, Social Action and Missions, Stewardship, and Technology. The Council shall be the policy-making body and shall be responsible for directing and coordinating all affairs, activities, responsibilities, and interests of the Church.
